The Tobacco Markei.

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 26.—The sales of tobacco at the various warehouses continue to exhibit a marked improvement in the extent of sales. Spain Distrusts the U.S. Government.

MADRID, Jan. 27 .- It is the general opion here that there is no prospect of the negotiations for a commercial treaty between Spain and the United States being successful. The Spanish authorities are distrustful of the intentions of the American Government.

Threatening to Kill Lord Rothschild.

LONDON, Jan. 27.-Isaac Jacob Maureberger, a respectable-looking German, has been committed for trial in this city for writing letters to Baron de Rothschild threatening to murder him. Examination showed that the prisoner was a lunatic.

BONDS TO BE ISSUED.

The mass meeting at the Court House last night was quite interesting and largely attended, and was presided over by Judge D. Schenck. At his request, Mayor King stated the object of the meeting. He said that the need of a system of waterworks, street improvements and a new graded school building had now come to be so felt that some action must be taken by the people on the question. He proposed that there be bonds issued to the amount of \$100,-000, to run for seventy-five years, the interest to be paid out of the city taxes.

Messrs. Benbow, Keogh, R. M. Sloan, W. E. Bevil, L. M. Scott and Judge Gilmer, in the order in which they are named, made short speeches in fovor of the proposition. No one spoke in opposition to the measure.

Mayor king then offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that the town issue bonds to the amount of \$100,000 for the public improvements.

2 That a committee of five be appointed to procure the proper legislation to effect this purpose.

The chair appointed the following gentlemen as committee to look after the matter: R. L. King, T. B. Keogh, A. P. Eccle, S. S. Brown, John Wolfe, Judge Schenck.

The meeting adjourned at 9.30 p. m.
