THE LATEST NEWS.

ROY-ALL FINED For Practicing Law Without Revenue License.

RICHMOND, VA., Feb. 9.—In the Hustings Court this afternoon Mr. Wm. L. Royall was fined \$50 for practicing law without a revenue license.

Using the Bomb at Lyons.

PARIS, Feb. 9.—The police office at Lyons was considerably shattered early this morning by the explosion of two bombs which had been placed against the railing of the office by some unknown miscreants.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—It was announced at noon from the officers of the Corbin Banking Company in this city that the strike, so far as the Reading company was concerned, was at an end.

Murdered His Brother.

SCRANTON, Pa., Feb. 9.—Late Monday night Barney Sullivan, aged 26, murdered his brother John, and attempted to murder his brother Thomas.

A Sugar Refinery for Baltimore.

BALTIMORE, Feb. 10.—It is definitely ascertained that Baltimore is to have added to her diversified industries, a sugar refinery, which will be located at Curtis Bay.

A Horrible Death.

CHICAGO, Feb. 9.—Richard a Honbrook, while waiting on one of the upper floors of the building at 234 fifth avenue, for an elevator thrust his head through a broken light of glass in the door of the elevator shaft, when the descending elevator caught him and crushed his head to a pulp.

A Strike in Patterson.

PATERSON, N. J., Feb. 9.—A general strike of the dickers has been inaugurated here. They demand a dollar more per week in wages, and that fifty five hours shall constitute a week's work.

Conferring With the President on the Fisheries Bill.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—Some of the Democratic members of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs called upon the President this morning to confer in reference to the Fisheries bill.

Manning's Bank.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—The Western National Bank, authorized capital \$3,000,000, was formally organized to-day. The officers are Daniel Manning, President; Conrad N. Jordan, vice-president; Ferdinand Blankenfort, cashier.

A Blind Woman Steps Into the River.

CHICAGO, Feb. 10.—The crowds passing over the Van Buren street bridge this morning were horrified by seeing a slightly built woman step into the river. Instead of sinking the unfortunate woman floated with the current, which is usually swift, borne up by her garments.

Daring Robberies.

MONTREAL, Feb. 9.—A most daring gang of American crooks are in the city attending the carnival. At 6 o'clock last evening they smashed the plate glass window in a jewelry store and rifled the windows of \$5,000 worth of diamonds and rings.

A Strike Settled.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Feb. 9.—The strike of 6,000 Monongahela river coal miners is practically settled and work will be resumed on nearly all the mines on the first, second and third pools tomorrow.

Guilty as Indicted.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—The trial of John L. West, colored, lately a clerk in the general land office on the charge of house-breaking and assault with intent to commit a rape on Mrs. Mary J. Page in November last in Washington was concluded this evening, the jury rendering a verdict of guilty as indicted.

Instantly Killed.

FORT WORTH, Tex., Feb. 9.—At 8:20 o'clock last night, T. J. Courtright was shot four times and killed instantly, by Luke Short, a well known sporting man of this city. Courtright was president of a detective agency. Short was promptly arrested and is now in jail.

The Defective Rail.

WHITE RIVER JUNCTION, V. T., Feb. 9.—A twelve-inch fragment of rail picked up at the scene of the Central Vermont accident shows that the rail from which it was broken must have been very defective.

Buying Horses for the Cavalry.

LONDON, Feb. 9.—A number of well known German horse buyers are scattered through Yorkshire, purchasing horses presumably for the artillery and cavalry service of the German army.

A Collision in the Bay.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—The steamer Knickbocker, from New Orleans, ran into an unknown bark off Sandy Hook in the bay last night and lost most of her bulwark, her mast head, and smashed a boat. The bark is thought to have escaped serious injury.

Bayoneting German Socialists.

BERLIN, FEB. 8.—The police attempted to disperse a socialist meeting which was being held in a book brewery at Stettin last evening, but failed. A force of military was then summoned and with fixed bayonets drove the people from the hall. Several of the people were wounded by bayonet thrusts, and one man is reported to have been killed.

At Magdeburg yesterday twenty-four Socialists were arrested on a charge of belonging to an illegal society.
