THE LATEST NEWS.

EIGHTY HORSES BURNED

Fire in a St. Louis Livery Stable --Loss \$150,000.

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 10.—Fire broke out about 11:30 o'clock last night in the livery stable of Jesse Arnot, at the corner of Ninth and Chestnut streets. Eighty horses were burned to death.

At one o'clock this morning two bodies were taken from the ruins; one was an employee who had not worked at the stables very long, and whose name cannot be learned; the other was Capt. Joseph Schimper, the freman of No. 6 engine company.

Almost the entire stable, a building one hundred feet wide, and running north and south from Chestnut to Market street and three stories high, is now in ruins, only portions of the two fronts being saved.

A Snarl Looked For.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—It is probable that there will be a snarl among the members of the House committee on appropriation on the consideration of the fortifications bill, of which there are five or six.

Carefully Considering the Pension Bill.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—The President is considering very carefully the dependent pension bill. He has obtained from the pension office an elaborate statement as to the probable outlay under the bill.

Reporting on the Civil Service.

WASHINGTON, FEB. 10.—The House committee on civil service, in reporting formally Mr. Cox's bill to increase the

salaries of the civil service commissioners from \$3,500 to \$5,000 a year, says: "That the public service has been purified and elevated by the efforts of the civil service commissioners, aided and sustained by the President, cannot be successfully denied."

Concerning Fortifications.

WASHINGTON, FEB. 10.—The conference committee of the two Houses of Congress on the fortifications bill finished their hearing of experts to-day but no action on the propositions was taken.

An Attempt to Rob a Post-Office.

BROAD BROOK, N. J., FEB. 10.—Thieves entered the postoffice here last night. They were discovered by the railroad agent and he at once opened fire on them.

The Freight Handlers' Raid

JERSEY CITY, Feb. 11.—The striking freight handlers of the Erie Railroad, made a raid upon the pier of the company's docks, where 200 of the Italians, who had taken their places, were asleep at 2 a. m. to-day.

A Railroad to be Sold.

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 10.—A decree was entered by the Federal court this morning, providing for the public foreclosure and sale, after thirty days notice, of the Indiana, Bloomington and Western Railway for not less than \$2,000,000.

A Town Submerged in Ice.

LYONS, Mich., Feb. 10.—Lyons is a sea of ice. Grand river rose during the night about four feet, and an ice gorge formed just below the city.

A Failure in New Berne.

NEW BERNE, N. C., Feb. 10.—J. E. Smith, of this place, general storekeeper, has failed, liabilities \$6,500.

A Gang of Incendiaries.

PINE HILL, Ark., Feb. 10.—There has been a good deal of excitement here lately over the work of a gang of incendiaries, who have infested this city. Saturday night a cotton gin was set on fire and burned to the ground.

A Resolution to Remove Ex-Gov. Holden's Disabilities—A Vote on the County Government Bill.

RALEIGH, N. C., Feb. 10.—In the House to-day a resolution was presented for the removal of Ex-Gov. Holden's disabilities. The railway commission bill was taken up on its second reading.

The House then voted on the bill to repeal the county government law. Overman moved to indefinitely postpone and called previous question.
