

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 16.-Even in the matter of committing suicide the adage where there's a will there's a way holds good. as James Winsloe, a Scotchman, demonstrated very effectively yesterday morning. He cast himself into the river at quite an early hour, and would have drowned had not bystanders rescued him and sent him to the house of his brotherin-law, on Tenth street, between Clark avenue and Walnut street. An attempt was made to get him to go to the City Hospital, but he refused, and just as the officers left him he went out of the house in his wet clothes, walking south. Some minutes later he was picked up, mangled and torn to pieces, on the railroad track in the bridge and tunnel yards between Ninth and Tenth and Spruce and Poplar streets. He stood by the track a short time watching the engines and cars go by, and at a convenient opportunity threw himself across the track in front of a freight car. The wheels passed over his chest and crushed him instantly. The remains were taken to the morgue. In the pocket-book in his coat was found a note which announced that his name was James Winsloe, 46 years old, married to Jane Greener in the city of St. Louis eighteen years ago, and telling his wife and all his children good-bye. Boston's Street Car Strikes.

BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 15-Twelve cars started out from the South Boston sta bles this morning and this alternoon the number was increased to twenty-five, making three minute trips to the city.

The arrest of two or three men for obstructing the way and of a dozen more for yelling "scab" has caused the crowds to become quiet, so that but two policemen go on each car,

The cars have been fairly well patronized, though the opposition barges run by the strikers carry more passengers. The company is hiring plenty of new men, if one can judge by the number of applicants.

It is reported that Weidner, Elkins & Co., of Philadelphia, have bought a controlling share in the stock of the road and will convert it into a cable railway. It is believed that the Board of Aldermen will not allow the Metropolitan road to locate in South Boston. The Consolidated road is trying to effect a union with the South Boston, but has not succeeded.

HOLYOKE, Mass., Feb. 16 .- The boarders at Mrs. Child's fashionable boarding-house, No. 264 Maple street, were poisoned at dinner yesterday, and some of them are in a dangerous condition. Forty persons have been more or less affected. Mrs. Childs' boarders, to the number of fifty, sat down to dinner, about 12.80 yesterday, and all partook of the food without any complaint being made. About 1 o'clock some of the boarders were taken violently ill with symptoms of arsonical poisoning. Prompt medical assistance was rendered the sufferers. Ten of the boarders who were not affected had not eaten any of the brown bread which was on the table. The sickness was attributed to the sour, stale meal from which the bread was made. Among those who ate the bread and were taken sick are Dr. Gardner, Dr. Bartlett, Dr. Humestone, J P Cushing, teacher at the High School; Mr. and Mrs. F A Fenno, Mrs. Clary, Frank McCameron, Miss Finch, Paymaster Bellows. of the Dean Street Pump Company. Miss Lawley and W J Cooper. They are nearly all better, and it is thought that they will recover. Some of them managed to visit their places of business, but all of them are still suffering. All complain of dazziness, with painful headache, sick stomach and sore boues. The bread will be analyzed.

HARTFORD, Feb. 16 .- The family of F. S. Amidon, consisting of himself, wite and three children, were to-day suddenly taken ill, with symptoms of poisoning. Dr. Fulier found them suffering from headaches and pains in the stomach which eccasioned trequent vomiting. All the family had eaten heartily of corn beef and cabbage for supper yesterday. As the meat had been eaten at two former meals without ill effect, it was concluded that the cabbage was the cause of the sickness. Mrs. Amidon purchased it from a peddler. Dr. Fuller thinks the cabbages had become impregnated with sewer gas by lying in a cellar. The children have recovered and Mr. Amidon is improving. Mrs. Amidon is very sick to-night. Dr. Fuller will analyze the cabbage. The peddler is unknown, but an effort will be made to find him.

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CONSPIRACY TRIAL.

Rejected Catholic Jurors Denounce the Unfair Action of the Crown.

DUBLIN, Feb. 16. -- In the Commission Court to-day Messrs. Dillon, Sheehy, Crilly and O'Brien plead not guilty to the charge of conspiracy to induce tenants to refuse paying their rents.

The Crown then proceeded to swear in a jury for the trial of the defendants. Several Catholic jurors, including one named O'Brien, were ordered to stand aside. Counsel for the defendants protested, and for a while there was much commotion. Mr. O'Brien, one of the defendants, declared he would rather be sent to jail at once than be submitted to a trial before a jury composed so unfairly that because a man's name was O'Brien he was excluded from it. Mr. Crilly denounced the Crown's conduct as ruffianly. Justice Murphy refused to interfere with the exercise of the Crown's privilege of challenging the jury.

After a long wrangle a jury of composite character was finally sworn. Its character portends disagreement.

River and Harbor Appropriations.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 16 .-Among the appropriations embodied in the River and Harbor bill as reported by Senate committee on commerce are the following : Improving Baltimore Harbor \$200,000; Continu-ing improvement Potomac River \$200,000; Approach to Norfolk, Va., \$100,000; Savannah, Ga., \$60,000; Mobile, Ala., \$55,000.

McCullom's amendment, with respect to the Hennepin Canal, is incorporated in the bill and the sum of \$50,000 in addition to an unexpended balance of the last River and Harbor bill is appropriated, for surveys and expenses. EVANSVILLE, Ind., Feb. 16 .- An. affecting scene occurred in the parlor of Mr. Peter Rosner's residence yesterday when an old gentleman of fine appearance entered and rushed forward to meet a young woman about 17 years of age. The affair was a happy one, being the reunion of a father and daughter after an absence of ten years. The gentleman was Mr. Daniel Chisman, a wealthy farmer living near Carnie, Ill., and the young woman was his daughter Annie who was stolen from home ten years ago. Detectives were employed and thousands of dollars spent to recover the child, but all efforts proved vain until recently, when it was learned that the abductors, tiring of their charge, had placed the child in an orphan asylum from where she was adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Rosner.

Fire in Petersburg.

PETERSBURG, Va., Feb. 16 .- David Dunlop's tobacco ectory (formerly D. B. Teunant & Co.'s) caught fire tonight about 10 o'clock and is a total wreck. Dunlop did an immense export business, probably the largest in the south. Loss estimated at about \$12,000; probably covered by insur-rance. Five hundred to six hundred hands are thrown out of work. Dunlop is already making arrangements to resume operations at once. A dwelling adjoining the factory was also burnt.
