THE HAMPTON FAMILY.

Correspondence of the News.

I accidentally ran against Samuel H. Hampton, yesterday. I learned from him some facts about himself and the Hamptons which may be of interest. He is a resident of Guilford county. In conversation he said that his grandfather came from Pennsylvania and settled in old Stokes county. His father's name was Martin H. He was born in 1800. He was a manufacturer of guns and tobacco, for which he found a market in Georgia, and as a little boy, Samuel accompanied his father on his journeys into that State.

Samuel was a member of the Second North Carolina cavalry in the late war. Dr. B. L. Cole was captain of Co. F., to which company he belonged. Gen. Wade Hampton's attention was directed to the dextrous use of the saber by Samuel and asked who he was. He was informed that he was a namesake of his, and had him called to him.

Senator Hampton is the third general bearing the name of Wade. First, he of revolutionary fame; second, he of the war of 1812; third, he of the late war, and now a Senator in Congress.

The given name of Wade is prevalent in all the branches of the family, which would indicate that it was used anterior to the age of the Senator's grandfather. OLD MAN.
