interest. He is a resident of Guilforl cdunty. In conversation he said that his grandfather came from Pennsylvania and settled in old Stokes county, His father's name was Mar-
tin H. He was born in 1800. He was a menufacturer of guns and to-
bacco, for which he found a market in Georgia, and as a little boy, Samuel necompanied his father on his jour-
neys that State. On one of these journeys, in 1839, Samuel remained at home, and, unfortunately, his
father was killed by the running away of his team. He was well known by the old people of Greens-
boro, for he moved from Stokes into our county and settled in what is
known to this day as Deep River set known to this day as Deep River set
tlement. Samuel was a member of the Second North Carolina cavalry in the late war. Dr. B. L. Cole was cap-
tain of Co. Fr., to which company he belonged. Gen. Wade Hampton trous use of the saber by Samuel and asked who he was. He was informed that he was a namesake of his, and
had him called to him. They compared family notes and the General informed Samuel that he and himself were descendants of the same

to this country from Ireland-two settled in Pennsylvania and one in
South Carolina, and that, probably from these three men descended al the Hamptons in the United States amuel was detailed by the General
