LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 8.—Wall, Smith & Co., proprietors of the Gilbert tobacco warehouse, made an assignment this evening. Liabilities \$75,000; assets \$100,000.

WASHINGTON, March 8.—The Supreme Court has today rendered a decision in the case brought from Tennessee which involves the right of one State or municipality to impose license tax upon drummers from another State seeking to sell goods by sample or otherwise.

Henry Ward Beecher.

Henry Ward Beecher was born at Litchfield, Conn., June 24, 1813, and came of a family distinguished in the Church and literature. His father, Lyman Beecher, was a minister, was fully as celebrated as his son afterward became, and was the author of a number of standard religious works.

Henry Ward Beecher was educated at Amherst College, graduating from that institution in 1834. He studied theology at Lane Seminary, and in 1837 became pastor of a Presbyterian church at Lawrenceburg, Ind. In 1839 he took charge of a church at Indianapolis. Here his talents brought him recognition, and in 1847 he received a call from Plymouth church, a new Congregationalist organization in Brooklyn.
