

Before beginning to preach, Mr. Beecher edited, in 1886, a newspaper, the Cincinnati Jou.nal, and , while pastor at Indianapolis had charge of an agricultural journal, his contribut'ons to it afterward being published under the title, "Fruits, Flowers, and Farming." For nearly twenty years he was an editorial contributor to the Independent, a weekly journal published in New York, and from 1861 to 1863 was its editor. His contributions to it were signed with a cross mark, and many of them were collected and published as "The Star Papers." Since 1870 he was editor of the Christia i Union, a weekly paper published in New York. His regular weekly sermons, as taken down by stenographers, have been printed and published since 1859. Eesides these he has published "Lectures to a Young Man," "Life Thoughts," "Sermons on Litercy and War," "The Plymouth Collection of Hymps and Tunes," "Norwood," a novel originally published in the New York Ledger, to which he was a constant cont. ibutor; Sermons from Published and Unpublished Discourses," "Life of Christ," and "Yale Lectures on Preaching." In 1863 he visited Great Britain, with the special purpose of disabusing the Eritish public in regard to the issues of the American civil war. His speeches exerted a wide influence and were published in London. In 1074, came the sensational Beecher-Tilton affair which became known to all the world through the remarkable trial which followed. News by Telegraph.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 8.-Wall Smith & Co., proprietors of the Gilbert tobacco warehouse, made an assignment this evening. Liabilities \$75,000; assets \$100,000.

CHICAGO, Ill., March 8 .- Mrs. Oscar Neebe, wife of the convicted anarchist, died , at midnight. The cause assigned for her death is apoplexy, but her brothe-in-iaw says she died of a broken heart.

PITTSBURG, Pa., March 8.-Dissatisfaction reigns supreme and almost every employee of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, except engineers and passenger conductors are either demanding an 'advance in wages, are on a strike, or threatening to strike.

WASHINGTON, March 8 .- The Supreme Court has to-day rendered a decision in the case brought from Tennessee which involves the right of one State or municipality to impose license tax upon drummers from another State seeking to sell goods by sample or otherwise. The decision is that such taxation is an interference with inter-State commerce, and therefore unconstitutional.

BERLIN, March 8.-In the Reichstag to-day the Septennate bill formally passed its first reading. Bismarck was present. The bill will be taken up for a second reading tomorrow and debate will ensue. Windthorst, leader of the Clerical party, will then declare his intentions in relation to the Septennate terms. Other party leaders have announced that they will vote as they did when the bill was defeated in the late Reichstag.

METTHIS, Tenn., March 8.- Jesse Harris and Isaac Rosentine, two petty merchants on pigeon roost road near this city, quarreled yesterday afternoon over a customer each was trying to secure. Harris struck Rosenstine, who drew a revolver and opened fire, emptying all the chambers. Five shots took effect, and Harris died in half an hour. Rosenstine was arrested and lodged in
