Boston, Mass,, March 14.-The o'clock accommodation train from Dedham, on the Dedham branch of the Boston \& Providence railroad, was running 20 miles an hour this morning, anc at $7: 10$ o'clock fel just inside of Boston city limits, the engine and three forward cars passed over in safety, but the last five cars including baggage and smoker, went down into the stone pavement below being crushed to splinters.
The accident was caused by a bro-

of the bridge. The structure was built in 1876. The train was crowded with business men and shop girls go-
ing to work. In the demolished cars there were 300 passengers, of whom
thirty were killed and fifty wounded, some very badly. All of those who soment over got off scott free. The es-
