Another Frightful R. R. Accident!! 30 Killed and 50 Badly Wounded.

BOSTON, Mass., March 14.—The 7 o'clock accommodation train from Dedham, on the Dedham branch of the Boston & Providence railroad, was running 20 miles an hour this morning, and at 7:10 o'clock fell through the bridge over South street, just inside of Boston city limits, the engine and three forward cars passed over in safety, but the last five cars, including baggage and smoker, went down into the stone pavement below, being crushed to splinters.

Artis Executed. A Goldsboro special to the Raleigh Visitor says: Henry Artis, the colored man convicted of the murder of his step daughter in Wayne county, and who was respited about two weeks ago by the Governor, was hung this (Friday) morning. The drop was sprung at 11:43 a. m., and his neck was broken. He was pulseless in 12 minutes. The body was cut down in 15 minutes. Dr. Jas. Spicer, county physician, presiding. Death ensued without a struggle and with only a few convulsive quivers of the body and muscles. He said: "My petition is, save me Lord Jesus. I knew nothing of the crime that I committed. I only know that whiskey brought me here." There were several hundred persons present. Everything was very quiet.

Minor Telegrams.

CHARLESTON, S. C., March 11.—Henry A. Middleton, died here today. He was born in 1793, and was the oldest inhabitant of Charleston. He belonged to the distinguished Middleton family of South Carolina. LANSING, Mich., March 12.—Mrs. John Mosby, angry over the punishment inflicted on her grandson, went to the room of Principal Cameron in the high school here yesterday, with a raw hide whip concealed under her cloak and lashed him soundly before she was disarmed. WASHINGTON, March 12.—Mr. R. C. J. Pendleton, of Indiana, the accredited agent of the Hendrick's Monumental Association called on President Cleveland to-day, and received from him a fair donation toward the proposed monument to the late Vice President. The President expressed an earnest sympathy with the movement. WHITESTOWN, Ind., March 11.—Dr. J. G. Hardy was cowhided on the street yesterday by Mrs. J. W. Vaughn, both of this place. The lady lashed him severely about the face. He finally wrested the cowhide from her grasp and escaped. Public sentiment is with the lady. She charged the Doctor with having taken improper liberties with her daughter, a girl under 15 years of age.

THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.

Manning's Retirement—A Rumor—Removal—A Denial, &c.

WASHINGTON, D. C., MAR. 12, 1887. Mr. Manning has formally retired from the Treasury Department, and left yesterday for New York to make final arrangements for his European trip. The chiefs of divisions and employees of the Treasury have subscribed \$1,000 for the purchase of a handsome testimonial to be presented to Mr. Manning as a token of their regard and esteem. The interest and speculation in regard to his successor seem to have subsided, and a disposition is shown, very graciously, to reinvest the President with the power of appointment, and calmly await his decision. The friends of Assistant Secretary Fairchild are hopeful of his promotion to the place, insisting upon the application of civil service rules, the urging his demonstrated fitness for the position; while others who see in the selection of a new Secretary a means for advancing party interests predict the appointment of a man with more of a National reputation and influence. It is the opinion among Democratic Congressmen and others having access to the President that there is no possibility of an extra session now. The failure of important legislation at the session just closed is recognized and urged as a justifiable necessity for an executive proclamation convening the next Congress in extra session immediately, but the President cannot be persuaded to that belief. The prevailing impression is that the Fiftieth Congress will be called together in the early fall, perhaps October. Questions of revenue and taxation, of fortifications, and others of great public interest must receive attention at the next session and it is now thought that the President will call a special session to begin in the fall, and that it will run along into the regular session, commencing on the first Monday in December. A rumor is now in circulation that Matthews, the President's colored protegee from Albany, is to be made chief of the Bureau of engraving and printing. Since Trotter was confirmed the people of the District are becoming resigned to the inevitable, and are disposed to receive the dose which the President compels them to take, although it is exceedingly nauseating. Trotter receives a compensation as Recorder of Deeds for the District in excess of that received by any other colored man in the country; his office pays from \$10,000 to \$12,000 a year. The President is meeting with considerable difficulty in deciding upon the Inter-State Commerce Commissioners. This owing to the large number of applicants whose claims are urged by a strong array of influence, and the necessity for a careful consideration of the fitness of the candidates, not alone from a personal standpoint but in view of the commercial and geographical reasons entering into the selection. Ex-Congressman Morrison, it is thought will be the Chairman. The President has commended to avail himself of the recent law repealing the Tenure-of-office act by removing two Republican office-holders, and it need not cause surprise if a considerable number of Republicans whose terms of office do not expire until 1888, suddenly find themselves beheaded. The Treasury Department is informed that many trade dollars offered for redemption in New York have been split and filled so skillfully as almost to defy detection. The art of counterfeiting, for the time being, has been supplanted by the art of substitution. The Navy Department authorizes an emphatic denial of the charge that our Government had bribed an employee of the English Naval workshops, into giving away governmental secrets in relation to the building of vessels, &c. It is as ridiculous as it is false, and is a very stupid attempt by its author to create a sensation. Designs for the new 6000 ton cruisers, are now being received by Secretary Whitney. An award of \$15,000 was authorized by Congress to be paid to the person whose design shall be accepted as the best.
