The plan was to levy upon the many valuable articles of dress and finery carried by Mrs. Langtry in her private car "Mayflower." When she awoke the matter was temporarily arranged by the actress giving bonds to appear here in the suit when the cases are called. Mrs. Langtry plays here tonight and to-morrow night.

#### Will Put Himself On Record.

NEW YORK, May 19 .- The Herald's Augusta, Me, special says that Mr. Blaine, while on the other side of the Atlantic, will put himself on record as a friend of Ireland. He will visit Gladstone soon after his arrival and will undoubtedly be asked to speak at homerule meetings, cauquet etc. These invitations he will accept. After getting Mr. Gladstone's appreciation, Mr. Blaine, accompanied by Mr. Parnell, will make a tour of Ireland, addressing public meetings.
