It is not a significant fact that the new rules apply only to the grades in which a majority of the incumbents are Republicans; and have not the slightest application to the classes in which Democrats predominate. There could be no objection to a rule which requires examination for promotion. To the contrary such a rule would be commended nniversally. But to compel all in the class next below that in which a vacancy may exist to undergo a technical examination, is an unreasonable exaction, and gives rise most reasonably to great complaint. It seems that the President is joint author with the Commissioners of the unpopular rules,

and if this be so, their strict execution may be expected. Senator Sherman's recent letter in which he declares himself in favor

of commercial reciprocity with Canada, is regarded as a true forecast of public sentiment, and as indicating the wise course to be pursued between the two countries. C., May 21 .- An executive order was issued this afternoon reorganizing the, internal revenue districts throughout the country, abolishing Iwenty two districts and dismissing the collectors and other officers of the districts abolished.
