Arrival of the Crown Prince Frederick William.

LONDON, June 15:- The feature of the elaborate preparations for the Queen's jubitee is the arrival of the Crown Prince Frederic William, of Prussia, who overshadows all of the other royal visitors in importance and interest.

The conflicting reports as to the gravity of his malady have added greatly to public concern in his movemeats and vastly increased his popularity, and next to the Queen herself, he will, unquestionably, be the most

conspicuous figure of the celebration. Frank Byrne, one of the Irish memters, has applied for a seat in Westminister Abbey at the jubilee ceremony. He anticipates a warm reception from his constituents. I scarcely like to mention the subject, but there is distinct nervousness on the part of many who are connected with the ceremony, from the Queen downward. The Queen has been overruled by Lord Salisbury. The pageant will now be a great State ceremonial, with 11,-000 troops under arms.
