WOOLING WITH A PISTOL.

Dr. Staudacher Shoots at Miss Kearney and Wounds Tailor Martin.

TERRE HAUTE, June 18.—Dr. Albert E. Staudacher, fifty years old, physician and druggist here, has been counting Laura Kearney, twenty-three years old, a clerk in Herz's notion store.

ST. LOUIS, June 18.—The Republican to-night received information from Jefferson City to the effect that on Monday morning the Supreme Court of Missouri will render an opinion affirming the judgment of the St. Louis Criminal Court in the case of Walter H. Lennox-Maxwell, and sentencing him to be executed.

No More War.

BOSTON, June 18.—R. E. Lee, Camp Confederate veterans arrived here this morning, and are the guests of the Post 15 G. A. R. They were met at Fall River by a delegation and upon their arrival in Boston a procession was formed consisting of the First Regiment Infantry, the 2d G. A. R. and Post 15 G. A. R.

Mrs. Cleveland at Aurora.

AURORA, N. Y., June 18.—Mrs. President Cleveland and party reached here shortly after 7 o'clock last evening. Mrs. Cleveland was taken to Wells' College at once, and as the carriage came up the drive way President Frisbee and the members of the faculty were ready with their welcome.

Confederate Veterans Received by Grand Army Boys at Lynn.

LYNN, Mass., June 18.—Most of the shoe factories are closed to-day and the city presents a holiday appearance. Robert E. Lee Camp, No. 1, Confederate Veterans, with ladies, and accompanied by John A. Andrew Post, G. A. R., of Boston, arrived here at 9.30 a. m., and were met at the depot by Post 5, G. A. R. and Company I of the Eighth Regiment M. V. M., of this city.

The Manufacturers' Association of this city and the citizens generally had made extensive preparations for the reception of the visitors, and the City Hall and many other buildings were profusely decorated.

Gen. Walsh Sent to Jail.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., June 18.—Just three weeks ago to-day Gen. W. P. Walsh was arrested and brought to this city, charged with criminal assault upon Mrs. Dyer. Since that time the trial has been in progress daily, and was ended this evening.

Taborn Hanged.

RALEIGH, June 18.—Shortly after 9 o'clock to-day Albert Taborn, colored, was publicly executed at Oxford, for burglarly and attempt to commit rape. The execution was public and the scene was about two miles from town.

Shot and Decapitated.

ANDOVER, N. J., June 18.—A boy going after cows found the body of a well-dressed, elderly man in the mountains, near the Amity School House, this evening. The spot where the body was found is about seven miles from here and is in a dense woods.

The Assembly Educational.

RALEIGH, June 18.—Nine hundred and forty members were reported as present at the Teachers' Assembly at Morehead to-day. A lecture on Latin by Prof. McIver, of Peace Institute, and discussion which followed, was very interesting.

Compelled to Land—The Gas Giving Out the Cause.

WASHINGTON, June 18.—The Signal Office has received a telegram from Professor Hazen, stating that the World balloon had landed at Centralia, Ills., at 8.17 last night.

ST. LOUIS, June 18.—A telegram to the Post-Dispatch from the World's balloon correspondent, Duffy, says that they were compelled to land at Hoffman, Clinton county, Ills., near Centralia, at 8.15 o'clock last night.

Moore, the aeronaut, received a very painful injury before starting, yesterday, and messages from Centralia state that this and the giving out of the gas was the cause assigned for the descent.

AMIENS, June 18.—The execution of the young matricide, Gausson, took place to-day. He was conducted to the guillotine barefooted, robed in white and wearing a black veil over his face.

LONDON, June 18.—The Progress of Wales and family and a score of members of foreign royal families attended a private exhibition of the Wild West Show this morning. They all rode in the Deadwood coach, the Princess of Wales sitting on the box, Col. Cody driving.

Seth Green Tells How to Fish.

"In the first place, when I go fishing, I go fishing. I don't hear the babble of the brook: I don't see the fluttering bird, nor the silvery leaves, nor the beautiful sky. Neither do I fish anybody else's line. I fish my own and I don't watch my companion, if I have one, to see when he gets a bite or not. I don't care whether he gets a bite or not. I am attending to my own business and looking for a good place to cast. I am looking for the fly that is on the water, and to see if there is a raise. If I see one, no matter if it is ten rods away, I mark the place and make for it. I don't run but go quietly along and keep fishing, and when I get within casting distance I drop my fly a little short, and if I don't get a rise the next cast is made exactly on the spot on which the fly lit. My fly does not go with a thud as though I wanted to hit the bull's eye; but it touches the water as lightly as a fond mother's hand touches the brow of a lovely child that she loves better than I can find words to express. I am just as sure of a rise, too, as the mother is that the child will roll its loving eyes up to the face with an expression which says to her, 'I am yours.' I feel my fly drops so gently on the water that it does not make a ripple, that the fish is mine. That is the secret of fishing."—Rochester Democrat.

The Logan Guard of Honor.

From the Washington Post. A few nights ago, while Rev. Buck, who for thirty years has been rector of Rock Creek Church Parish, was coming through the cemetery connected with the church he was halted by the guard at Logan's tomb. He had some trouble in passing the line, and has since stated that he would like to have the guard removed. He holds that the presence of the soldiers is not only unnecessary but inappropriate.

Ransom Declines.

A Washington special to the Richmond Dispatch says: It having been decided that Secretary Lamar shall be Associate Justice of the Supreme Court vice Justice Woods, deceased, the position of Secretary of

the Interior was offered to Senator Ransom. It was declined. I have this on high authority. The Senator's friends say that he feels that he can be of more service to the Democratic party and the Administration in the Senate than in the Cabinet. Also that he has always given his services to the public with special reference to the interests and welfare of North Carolina. They say that it is certain he can serve his State better where he is than in any other capacity whatever.

SOME GEOGRAPHICAL ITEMS.
