JOINT RAILROAD RATES.

The Order of the Inter-State Commission in Regard to the Publication of Tariffs.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—At a meeting of the Inter-State Commerce Commission this morning, the subject of the publication of joint tariffs being under consideration, the following preamble and order were unanimously adopted and directed to be sent to all railroad companies, subject to the "Act to regulate commerce."

Terms of the New Postal Treaty.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Postmaster General Vilas has made public the terms of the new postal treaty between the United States and Mexico. The treaty provides that the mails of each country shall be open to all matter now mailable under the law of either country, and mail matter is to be subject to rates and regulations now governing in the country in which it originates.

Murderer Blunt Baptized.

ST. LOUIS, June 22.—Should there not be any interference by the Governor, Alfred Blunt, the little hunchback negro will pay the penalty of his crime on Friday next. Blunt, in May, 1887, murdered his wife by hacking her with a hatchet and razor at her home in Carondelet. Yesterday afternoon Elder O. Brown, of the Colored Second Baptist Church, baptized Blunt, which appeared to greatly relieve him as to his approaching death.

Died From Heart Disease.

ASHEVILLE, N. C., June 22.—Maj. Charles B. Duffield, formerly of Norfolk, Va., and late resident of Asheville, was found dead in his bed this morning. The cause of death was heart disease. The deceased was about 68 years old.

A REGION OF TERROR.

A Frightful State of Affairs in Rowan County, N. Y.

LXINGTON, June 22.—Information just received in Lexington, Ky., from a reliable source, says a terrible state of affairs exists in Morehead, Rowan county seat. The friends of the murdered Martin and of the butchered Logan boys who lived in the upper edge of the county and also in the adjoining county, have formed themselves into a band of regulators, and propose to wreak summary vengeance on Craig Tolliver and his blood thirsty henchmen.

Tolliver has received several notes warning him that the town of Morehead would be burned and the people slaughtered. Consequently every citizen in Morehead goes armed, and sleeps on their arms at night. The women scarcely sleep at all, fearing the coming of the mob. Last Friday night was set to burn the town, but the place was guarded so well that the attempt, though made, was abandoned.
