

She told me that Craig knew that his hour had come, and he had no hope of reaching the brush when he made the break for liberty. Just before starting out he declared 'They've always said I'd die with my boots on, but I'll be---- if I do,' and with that he stooped down and pulled off his shoes and started for the railroad in his sock feet From what this woman told me I'm sure that Craig Tolliver was not afraid to meet his death at the hands of his enemies. He was very much excited and somewhat rattled because he couldn't see anybody to shoot at, but he was not at all afraid to die. He
