TWO WOMEN TERRIBLY WHIPPED. Methods Used by Knights of the Switch for Social Puria-

cation. WINCHESTER, O., June 29 .- The organization known as the Knights of the Switch was formed in this (Adams) county some six months ago for the purpose of driving out disreputable persons and breaking up disorderly houses. The first act of the organization, which is about one hundred strong, was to whip and tar and feather several women of bad character.

GIRARD, La., June 29 .- A riot occured at Oak Ridge this morning, about 5.30 o'clock, in which two white men and six negroes were killed and several white men dangerously wounded. Parties arriving here to-day give the following particulars: Yesterday evening a negro man, living in the vicinity of Oak Ridge, as saulted a white girl. He was arrested about 7 p. m., and when the deputies were taking him to the calaboose they were fired upon by Jerry Baldwin, colored, his two sons and three other negroes, wounding Deputies Baker and Gardner. The negroes then dispersed, and later rendezvoused at a negro cabin two miles from ones that recovered." town.

Learning their whereabouts the officers went to arrest them. On approaching the cabin they were fired upon and one of their number, G. W. Higginbotheam, was killed and Constables John Conger, Gardner and Baker dangerously wounded. Durother negroes were killed.

A courier just arrived from Oak Ridge reports everything quiet. Twenty men from Bastrop have arrived there. Conger, who received eleven bullet wounds, died at 3 o'clock to-day.

LONDON, June 29. - Society draws the following picture of the aged Empress Augusta of Germany: "She is fourteen years younger than her husband, and still she continues assiduously to repair by aid of art the ravages of time. Imagine a face wrinkled and pinched, topped by an enormous black wig; sunken cheeks, glowing with unnatural color; a pair of dark, lusterless eyes staring into vacancy; a scrawny neck, once the admiration and envy of the court, now a mass of cords and sinews; a figure, bent with age and infirmities, supported by a stout walkingstick, or leaning upon the arm of an attendant, and you have the picture of the Empress as she appears in public or at court festivals. You could not obtain in Berlin to-day a photograph or picture of the Empress of more recent date than twenty or twenty-five years ago."
