



NEW ORLEANS, July 9 .- The Continental Guards of this city, an organization that includes among its members veterans of the Union and Confederate armies, yesterday visited Beauvoir, the home of Jefferson Davis. Mr. Davis addressed the command as follows: "The day is full of sacred memories, and your uniforms carries the mind back to the time when our sires pleiged life, property and sacred honor to maintain the declaration made on the 4th of July, 1776. That declaration gave to the worki great American principle of the innate equality of a man, and that Government derived all its rightful power from the consent of the governed. 


