STRANGELY TERRORIZED.

Persons Driven from the Region by a System of Persecution. CHARLESTON, S. C., July 9.—In the town of West Union, Oconee County, five men, who have hitherto borne good reputations, are now in jail, charged with having formed a conspiracy to defame and libel.

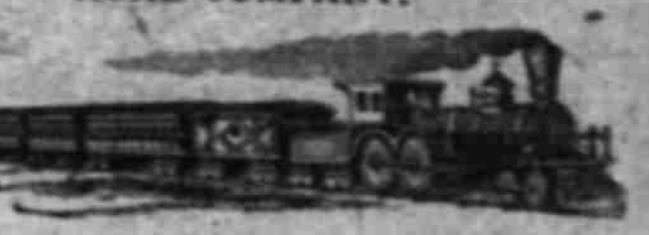
