DEATH FROM HYDROPHOBIA.

ATLANTA, Ga., July 25.—A frightful death from hydrophobia is reported from Faircloth, in Mitchell County, on Friday, the victim being Mr. Hannibal Crosson, a much esteemed farmer of that community.

It was determined to submit the symptoms to the infallible test for hydrophobia, viz., water. The patient consenting, four strong men held him secretly and a tablespoonful of water was administered.

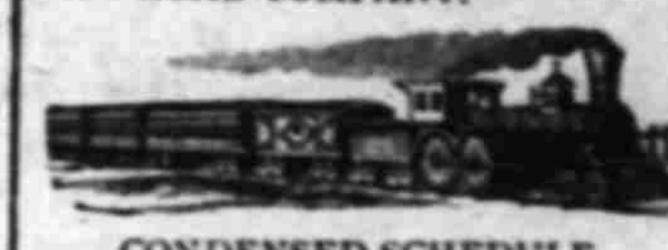
