THE LATEST NEWS.

They Eloped on a Horse-Car.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., July 26.—A horse-car elopement case occurred in this city yesterday. For some time Miss Ellen Shippey, daughter of Horace M. Shippey, of Greenwich avenue, has been enamored of Edward G. Ploquet, who formerly lived in this city, but now lives in Bridgeport.

A Young Woman Drowned at Newport.

NEWPORT, R. I., July 26.—Miss Rebecca Hunter, daughter of the late Capt. Andrew Hunter, and well known by many summer residents here, was drowned off the Forty Steps at the cliffs this afternoon under very peculiar circumstances.

LONDON, July 26.—The Duchess of Edinburgh to-day launched a life-boat at Bembridge, Isle of Wight. The temporary staging, on which the Duchess and the members of her party stood, collapsed during the ceremony of launching.

Hanged for Assaulting a Girl.

CHICAGO, July 26.—A Times special from Kauffman, Tex., says: "An infuriated mob of men took Crawford Benson, a negro boy 18 years old, from the county jail at 11 o'clock last night and hanged him, afterward riddling him with bullets. He had committed an assault on a 9 year old girl.

Yellow Fever.

KEY WEST, July 26.—One new case of yellow fever developed today. No deaths occurred.

DONATIONS TO THE GUILFORD BATTLE GROUND CO.

Major Jas. W. Wilson, of Morganton, has donated a beautiful polished shaft of flesh-colored marble, from Red Marble Gap, on the Western North Carolina Railroad, to the Guilford Battle Ground Company, and authorized the Company to get out as much marble from his quarry as it may need.

Col. Roger J. Page, of Asheville, has donated some beautiful slabs of mica ceous slate, which is bedusted with garnet crystals, all over it, to box the springs on the property, and is willing to send the Company more, from his wonderful quarry of this curious rock if needed.

Mr. E. B. Thomas, General Manager of the Richmond & Danville Railroad Co., will give free transportation to the monuments to Greensboro, and Col. Julius A. Gray, President of the Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley Railway, will land them safe and free on the Battle Ground.

A wealthy citizen of Western North Carolina has under consideration a still more liberal and costly donation than any of the former ones. The success of the scheme exceeds all expectations, and soon our citizens will rejoice in the redemption of this sacred spot and in having one of the loveliest parks in the South, within 45 minutes drive of our city.

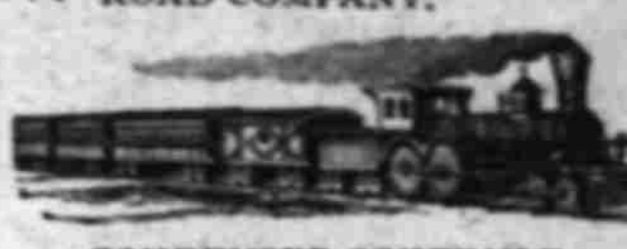
