WANTED TO MARRY HIM AT SIGHT.

An Indian Maiden's Infatuation Leads to a Couple of Murders.

AIKEN, Minn., July 31.—At Kimberly yesterday a half-breed named Sankada shot and killed an Indian known as Joe Amos and attempted to shoot another Indian named Miscanango.

The trouble originated last Sunday when a small party of white men visited the Indian camp, then near Aiken. The Indians had been drinking freely and were very hilarious.

Probably Killed the Wrong Man.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., July 31.—Two men named Peters and Johnson are reported to have been killed in the Indian Territory Friday night by a gang of desperadoes, who surprised them while camped on a creek in the Choctaw Nation.

KANSAS CITY, July 31.—Thomas Welch, aged fifty-five, a veteran from the Leavenworth Soldiers' Home, came here to witness the ball game at Armourdale between the soldiers' nine from Fort Leavenworth and an amateur team of that suburb.

THE NATIONAL CAPITAL.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2, 1887.

The latest gossip of interest in political circles is the decidedly unique scheme, though not as yet dangerously developed to attempt to organize the next House of Representatives on a tariff issue by which either the free traders or the protectionists shall secure the organization instead of, as always heretofore, electing the officers upon party lines.

The whole scheme is visionary and will hardly attain to the dignity of a serious contemplation. The signs of the political times however seem to point to a possible readjustment of parties upon a tariff basis.

The singular spectacle of a pensioner voluntarily surrendering his pension is presented in the letter just received by commissioner Black from a pensioner in Kansas in which the writer asks that his name be stricken from the rolls, stating that he had been cured by "faith in the lord."

Secretary Whitney has just concluded negotiations for supplying steel ordnance for the Navy. The Hatch-Kiss Company with which the contract has been made, has agreed to establish a factory in this country and to use American steel.

RALEIGH NOTE.

What Trebuch Finds to Write about at the State Capital.

RALEIGH, August 1, 1887. A meeting of citizens was held in the court house Friday night last to make further arrangements for inviting President Cleveland to the next State Fair. Resolutions were passed and a committee was appointed to make the necessary arrangements with the railroad authorities for the transportation of the President from Atlanta.
