THE EARTH SINKS IN KENTUCKY.

After the Earthquake on Monday Night.

CHICAGO, August 3.-A special from Evansville, Ind., referring to a sinking of land in Trigg County, Ky., since the earthquake Monday night, says: "About midnight everybody was awakened by a sharp shock and had barely jumped to their feet when the earth with a shaking, dizzy motion suddenly sank five feet, carrying houses and terrified darkies with it. The scene that ensued baffles discription. The negroes fell on their knees and in frenzied tones "prayed the Lord to save them." Others began shouting and praising casting an upward glance to see if chariots of fire were not descending. him away from her house. Added te this pandemonium was the intense darkness which prevailed, the moon being completely obscured by heavy black clouds, which hung very low and like a pall over the doomed district. Rumblings were heard from the depths below, which gradually became louder, and numerous springs, hidden for years, suddenly found an opening and began to bubble upward in constantly increasing streams. The terrified inhabitants, not pausing for household, goods or chattels, gathered their offspring and rushed away from the doomed spot, and some of them are still putting as much distance between them and the sinking land as possible. The loss to property is incalculable. A large area of corn and tobacco is a total loss.

Only One of the Right Men Hanged.

MCKINNEY, TEX., Aug. 2.-About fifteen years ago a man named Ballou was hanged in this (Collin) county for the murder of one Golden. The men came together from Indiana to Texas on a prospecting tour. After the murder Ballou returned to Indiana, and wearing the murdered man's clothing, married Golden's sister. Suspicion was aroused and he was arrested and condemned to death. A few days ago a man named Mix, on his death bed, confessed that he murdered Golden. He gave a minute description of the whole affair. Mix said that he was hired by Ballou to commit the

A Horrible Scheme of Vengance.

PANAMA, Aug. 3.-In Los Andes, Cill, lived a man who hated a family that resided near him. When small pox appeared in the province recently he secretly obtained a number of dried pustules, and these he placed inside a plug of tobacco, which he threw away in a place where the people he hated were likely to see it. One of the children picked up the tobacco and gave it to her parents, who made cigarettes from it and smoked them. A few days afterwards small-pox broke out in the house, and with such virulence that no one of the family escaped. The criminal, however, was attacked with the disease a few days afterwards and died after confessing his crime.

TUSCALO, Ill., Aug. 2 .- Mrs. Fannie Hayne, wife of James Hayne, was gored and trampled to death by a mad bull yesterday, while attempting to drive the brute out of the front yard. She fought the animal as long as her strength held out but as no one came to her assistance she was killed before the eyes of her little children. The body was shockingly mangled.

SHE CANT LOCK OUT HER AN AERONAUT'S RIDE.

Charles Williams Goes Up in s Balloon and Descends in a Parachute.

A Cincinnati special of Sunday says A young aeronaut named Chas. Williams made a successful ascent in balloon and descent in a parachute at 6 o'clock last evening from a resort ten miles up the Ohio known as Coney Island. The great heat in the city and the novelty of the attraction led some 1,500 people to take boats for the appointed place. The balloon used was inflated with hot air. The parachute was closed, and its upper end was attached to the bottom of the balloon basket by a stout piece of rope. The aeronaut rode in a basket attached to the parachute. When He says that such a proceeding everything was ready for the ascent the parachute looked very much like a lot of cloth and cords hanging by the upper end from the balloon and flaring except through the proper channel slightly from the lower end. When the ropes were cut the balloon rose slowly

As it rose it was carried to the east by a current, which at the earth's surfrom the starting point, but in full view of the crowd. Williams had attached Over 300 People On a Sink- a pruning-knife to a cord in such a way that when he pulled the cord the knife would sever the rope by which the parachute was attached to the balloon. He pulled the cord; the knife did its work: the balloon, relieved of its load, shot upward and the parachute dropped toward the earth. At the end of the first hundred leet the parachute was about half opened and its descent had been very perceptibly

As it continued to fall it continued to spread out, and at the end of 500 feet was fully opened. It then slowly descended to the earth. -As the parachute opened out and the descent was checked the basket was given a swinging motion, and at one time described an arc of fully 54 degrees. The parachute touched the earth in the middle from the basket without having received a scratch. The descent occupied just 100 seconds.
