THE EARTH SINKS IN KENTUCKY.

After the Earthquake on Monday Night.

CHICAGO, August 3.—A special from Evansville, Ind., referring to a sinking of land in Trigg County, Ky., since the earthquake Monday night, says: "About midnight everybody was awakened by a sharp shock and had barely jumped to their feet when the earth with a shaking, dizzy motion suddenly sank five feet, carrying houses and terrified dummies with it."

Only One of the Right Men Hanged.

MCKINNEY, TEX., Aug. 2.—About fifteen years ago a man named Ballou was hanged in this (Collin) county for the murder of one Golden. The men came together from Indiana to Texas on a prospecting tour.

A Horrible Scheme of Vengeance.

PANAMA, Aug. 3.—In Los Andes, Cill, lived a man who hated a family that resided near him. When small pox appeared in the province recently he secretly obtained a number of dried pustules, and these he placed inside a plug of tobacco, which he threw away in a place where the people he hated were likely to see it.

Gored to Death by a Mad Bull.

TUSCALOOSA, Ill., Aug. 2.—Mrs. Fannie Hayne, wife of James Hayne, was gored and trampled to death by a mad bull yesterday, while attempting to drive the brute out of the front yard.

SHE CAN'T LOCK OUT HER HUSBAND.

An Injunction Denied Because it Might Set Just Like a Divorce.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Aug. 3.—Judge Rice to day filed a decision in a unique case. Mrs. Rufus J. Bell, a leading society lady and sister of Mrs. Judge Woodward, not long ago applied for an injunction to restrain her husband from coming into the house where she and her family resides and which is her property.

Judge Rice denies the motion. He says that such a proceeding would be equivalent to the Court directing a separation of man and wife, which it has not power to do except through the proper channel of a divorce suit.

Over 300 People On a Sinking Steamer.

PETERSBURG, Va., Aug. 2.—The steamer George Law left her wharf in this city for Claremont, on the James River, about 8 A. M. to-day, having on board an excursion party numbering 350 persons.

Fatal Riot.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., August 3.—Reports received from Manchester, Clay county, in the Southeastern corner of the State, distant from telegraphic communication say that a riot occurred during Monday's election, in which six men were killed.

JAY JEROME'S RIDE.

Charles Williams Goes Up in a Balloon and Descends in a Parachute.

A Cincinnati special of Sunday says: A young aeronaut named Chas. Williams made a successful ascent in a balloon and descent in a parachute at 6 o'clock last evening from a resort ten miles up the Ohio known as Conroy Island. The great heat in the city and the novelty of the attraction led some 1,500 people to take boats for the appointed place.

As it rose it was carried to the east by a current, which at the earth's surface was hardly perceptible. When the balloon had reached the altitude named it was fully a mile and a half from the starting point, but in full view of the crowd.

As it continued to fall it continued to spread out, and at the end of 500 feet was fully opened. It then slowly descended to the earth. As the parachute opened out and the descent was checked the basket was given a swinging motion, and at one time described an arc of fully 54 degrees.

A Comprehensive Attempt.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 2.—Feliz P. Murphy, an ex-canvasman for a circus, whose wife and family live in New York City, locked himself in his room at the Mound City House this morning and, with a dull razor, inflicted three gashes, each about three inches long and about a quarter of an inch deep, on the left an inch deep and four inches long in the side, two flesh wounds in his left wrist and a gash in his right arm.

A bookseller named Korrbreen, of Berne, Switzerland, and assistant were killed recently while making an ascent in the Overland without a guide.

There have recently been numerous incendiary forest fires in the vicinity of Athens, Megara and Corinth. An immense amount of damage has been done.

Advices from Malta say that there have been two fatal cases of Cholera there, and that four bills of health are being issued to vessels departing from the island.
