STILL'ROBBING THE WHITE LAVES.

Mine Bosses Extorting Money from the Oppress ed Workmen.

WALKESBARE, Pa., Aug. 13 .- Another example of the systematic way in which many of the mine employees are abused and opressed came to light to-day in the arrest of Charles Munday, a mine boss in the emptoy of the Susquehanua Coal Company at Nanticoke. He has been making a practice of extorting money from men and boys employed in the breaker and mine and in return getting them higher wages for a time.

John Koswoki, the prosecutor, was employed in the breaker under " Mun day, picking slete for 65 cents a day. He asked for more wages, when Munday offered to give him a better position at \$1.20 a day if he would give him \$5 in cash. Koswoski gave him the money and was given work at the increased bay. Four days after he was discharged and now he charges Monday with extorting money under | ing will commence just as soon as surfalse pretense. This system is practised by other bosses in Nonticoke and elsewhere, and the Susquehanna Coal Company have announced their readiness to push all cases brought to their attention.

Mexico's Wiggins Flies for His Life.

CITY OF MEXICO, Aug. 10.-The day has passed without the occurrence of the earthquake predicted by Senor Zuniga. At 10 A. M., the time appointed for the catastrophe, the churches were thronged with nervous worshippers. A large crowd sought safety in the Alameda, Zuniga has disappeared, fearing rough treatment. Some young bloods theatened to thrash him. He has still many adherents among the superstitious, who buy his pamphlets and read his dismal vaticiuations with avidity.

Murdered and Thrown in a River.

PARKERSBURG, W. Va., Aug. 13 .-Wallace Sayre, son of Daniel Sayre, of Letart, returned home last Saturday from Guyandotte, where lie had been conducting one of his father's stores. On Sunday young Syre crossed the Ohio River in a skiff to visit a friend named Alexander. He left Alexander's place about midnight, after which time nothing was seen or heard of him until Tuesday night, when his body was found in the water on the West Virginia side. A number of fearful wounds were on the body, either of which would have been fatal. His clothing was weighted down with stones placed there for the purpose of keeping the body at the bottom of the river. All of Sayre's money and valuables were gone. One arrest has been made on suspicion.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., August 11. Four hundred and one convicts confined in the main prison at Nashville have appealed to the people of Tennessee to work for the adoption of the prohibitory amendment.
