THE LATEST NEWS.

VOODOOISM KILLED HIM.

Dosed with Powder, Shot and Other Mysterious Mixtures Made at Midnight.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Aug. 15.—An extraordinary illustration of human credulity has been developed in the trial at Arkansas City, Ark., of Dr. Henry Harris, charged with the murder of James Venters, a colored man who had accumulated considerable property.

It appears Venters had taken a dose of powder and shot, besides other mixtures of a mysterious nature. When he died Harris was put on trial for murder. The evidence showed a limitless range of ignorance and duplicity.

The jury, however, found Harris guilty of manslaughter, fixing his punishment at eight months imprisonment. There is much dissatisfaction.

CHATSWORTH.

Two Men Arrested as the Incendiaries Who Caused the Wreck.

CHICAGO, August 15.—The Times to-day has a dispatch stating that two men have been arrested on the charge of being the incendiaries who caused the Chatsworth horror. The authority given for the information is a man named L. Dobbs, who has been working for some time past for a farmer named Morris Kenoya, about three miles from Kentland, Ind.

Revolution in Tucuman.

PANAMA, Aug. 15.—The Buenos Ayres Herald thus describes the late military riot in Tucuman:

"It was reported on June 5 that a revolution had occurred in Tucuman; that the Governor had been deposed and that the city was in a state of siege."
Later advices say: "After a tenacious resistance the revolution has triumphed. The Governor and his Ministers are prisoners. There was a fight for more than twenty hours. Great satisfaction is felt all over the city."

The picket then divided into two parties, one of which took refuge in the Cathedral and the other in the Cabildo, from which positions they kept up a continuous fire on the people in the street.

The Governor on hearing what had occurred went to Dr. Zavala's house for protection. He remained there for some hours and then passed to the opposite side of the block, where he was besieged by the people, and he appears to have surrendered with his ministers. It is said that the ordinary business of the city was not interrupted except in the locality where the fighting was going on.

Says She Was Abducted and Sold.

TOLEDO, O., Aug. 14.—The sale of a wife for a glass of wine has created a sensation here and resulted in the arrest of Eugene Severy, of Susquehanna, Pa., and W. S. Cowell, of South Valley, N. Y. The girl who was sold claims that she was abducted from the home of her grandmother and says that she was a member of one of the wealthiest families in Susquehanna.

Gallant Rescue by an Old Man.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Aug. 14.—The three-year-old child of John McGlinn, of No. 584 Armstrong street, yesterday fell into a cistern which is sixteen feet deep and contains about twelve feet of water, Michael McNamara, the child's grandfather, immediately plunged in. The child had sunk twice and was just coming up to the surface when he caught it by the neck.

The capital stock of this company is \$20,000, with the privilege of extending the same to \$100,000. Over \$10,000 worth of stock has been taken.
