He Writes Urgent Letters to Her and Procures Public Notice of Their Engagement.

A young fellow, said to be employed on a railroad at King's Creek, W. Va., and who calls himself J. M. Traber, has, with much more assurance than sense, been trying to captivate Miss Nellie Gould, eldest daughter of Mr. Jay Gould.

Very soon after that Miss Nellie Gould received marked copies of certain papers in which Traber had contrived to have favorable notices printed.

Recently Traber seems to have secured the following notice of himself in a western paper:

"The engagement is announced of Miss Nellie Gould, eldest daughter of the New York millionaire, to Mr. J. M. Traber, a bright young railroad employee at King's Creek, W. Va. It is said the nuptials will be solemnized early next year."

CORK, Aug. 19.—Michael Davitt and the Archbishop of Cashel promised to attend the opening of the Piscatorial School at Baltimore, County Cork, to-day, but Mr. Davitt, learning that the Queen was to be toasted, absented himself.

Stanley Alive on the 19th of June.

LONDON, Aug. 19.—Letters were received here yesterday from Henry M. Stanley, dated June 19, from Gambuya, a village near the rapids of the Aruwimi, reporting himself and party all well.

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 18.—Hibbert Stairs, of the Royal Engineers, one of Explorer Stanley's most trusted lieutenants, is a son of John Stairs, of this city. If Stanley has been massacred, there is little doubt that the same has befallen the young engineer.
