THE LATEST NEWS. THE INDIAN WAR

100 Bucks Making Their way to Colorow's Camp.

GLENWOOD SPRINGS, Aug. 24 .-No news has yet been received from Sheriff Kendall and his posse of seventy-five men who left here Sunday morning to arrest the two Indians, indicted for horse stealing, and fears are entertained for their safety. A courier arrived at 1 o'clock last night and reported that a band of 100 bucks from the Uinih agency, had been seen making their way toward Colorow's Camp on Milk river. This news was of such a serious character that Gen. Peardon, who is camping about 25 miles from here, near Shionce creek, with a company of militia, will immediately move into Meeker for the protection Leaves for Richmond at 8.32 am of the town. It is rumored that Chapita, the widow of Auray, the most powerful chief who ever ruled over the Utes, was killed by the sheriff's party at one of his first encounters with the Indians. If such is the case it is thought serious trouble cannot be avoided.

A Dreadful State of Things In West and Southwest Virginia.

CHICAGO, August 24.-A special trom Hinton, W. Va., says: Informatiom received here from McDowell county is to the effect that a dreadful state of affairs exists in that portion of the State and southwestern Virginia. The drought has made the waters very low and the peculiar disease which has several times previously followed this condition and which is supposed to be the result of minerals in the water has broken out. In the Dead Horse Cove neighborhood there are over too cases, with thirty deaths. Not a family has escaped. The crops are neglected and farm-work is at stand-still, it requiring the entire time of evey individual able to labor to care for the sick and dead. It is estimated that 200 people have died in Mc-Dowell county alone during the last four months from the disease.

The Colored Free Masons.

CHICAGO, Aug. 24.-The Colored National Masonic Convention assembled in this city to-day. This is the first national convention of the fraternity, and colored Masons all over the United States have manifested great interest in its deliberations. The delegaters are representatives of the Grand Lodges of the various States, and most of them are Grand Masters of their respective lodges. There is no supreme body in the fraternity higher than the Grand Lodges in the different States as there is in the more ancient Masonry of the white race, consequently the body which began its work to day has no legislative powers. The fraternity numbers. nearly 100,000 members, but the Order has never been recognized by the white Masons of the United States.

Seventh-To abolish polygamy in the United States immediately and entire-

Eighth-To enact and enforce such laws as will tend to eradicate intem-Ninth-To develop the resources o

the country by a wise system of internal improvements. Tenth-To protect and promote the American system of free common

schools. Eleventh -- To adjust the relations between labor and capital on a permanent basis of equity and justice.

And especially do we invite the representatives and members of the following organizations to meet and co-operate with us in said convention. viz,: The Patriotic Order Sons, of America, the Order of United American Menhanics, the Junior Order of United American Mechanics, the Order of Deputies, the Sons of the Revolutionary Sires, the Political Alhance, the United Minute-Men, the various Granges and all other orders and organizations whose principles and sentiments will enable them to work in the American party on the fore-going basis.

A BRITISH MEMORIAL TO CONGRESS.

A Deputation of the House of Commons to go to Wash. ington and Present it.

LONDON, Aug. 24.-The memorial to the President and Congress of the United States in favor of the conclusion of a treaty which will stipulate that differences arising between America and England, which cannot be adjusted by diplomatic agency, shall be referred to arbitration, has been signed by 200 English, Scotch and Welsh members of the House of Commons, including Mr. John Bright, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, Sir George Trevelyan, Mr. Mundella, Mr. Stansfeld, Sir Lyon Playfair and Mr. H. H. Fowler. It has now been arranged that the deputation which is to present the memorial shall leave England during the first week of October, and the memorial will be presented at Washington about the middle of the month. The deputation, which will consist of about twelve members of the House of Commons, five of whom will be labor representatives, is to be presented to President Cleveland by Mr. Andrew Carnegle, who has taken an active interest in the matter. Mr. Cremer, M. P., the Secretary of the Workmen's Peace Association, will accompany the deputation, as will also Mr. Burt, M. P., the President of the association. Lord Herschell and Sir Lyon Playfair will join the deputation in America.
