THE LATEST NEWS.

MRS. ANDREW JACKSON DEAD.

She was Mistress of the White House When the Old General Was President.

NASHVILLE. Tenn., Aug. 25 .-Mrs. Sarah Jackson died at the Hermitage yesterday, aged eighty-one years. Col. Andrdw Jackson, of West Point, who was an artillery officer in the late war on the Southern side, is her son and Mrs. Dr. John Lawrence is her daughter. A son,

Samuel, was killed at Chickamauga. Mrs. Sarah Jackson was for nearly four years the mistress of the White House. At about the beginning of Gen. Jackson's second term as President his adopted son, Andrew Jackson, jr., married Miss Sarah York, of Philadelphia, a girl of accomplishment, of good family and great beauty. The adopted son, who was a nephew of Mrs. Jackson, took his young bride to the White House. President Jackson was then a widower, Mrs. Jackson, having died after his first election and before he became President. Gen. Jackson, during all his first term, was mourning the loss of his wife, and the ooung wife of his adopted son comforted him in his affliction and was a most devoted daughter. When he died he left a fine estate. This was lost and the family were in straitened circumstances. Andrew Jackson, jr. died in 1867. The fuheral of Mrs. Jackson was held to-day at the Hermitage.

Col. Woodward, of New York to Back a New Anti-Cleveland Paper in the South.

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 25 .- It is announced that a new paper, to be called the Daily World, is to be started here within two weeks. The Constitution is committed Cleveland, and it is said that the new paper is to be strongly anti-Cleveland, and that the funds up on whice it is to subsist have been furnished by the political friends of Gov. Hill, of New York. Mr. G. K. Woodward, who is to have charge of the paper, is a New Yorker. He said to-day;

'I am not willing to foreshadow the policy of the paper, but I am willing to say this: Cleveland owes his election to the Civil-Service Reform Asso. ciation. He has given that association offense by disregarding civil-service reform idea in States where such associations do not exist. Blaine is offensive to the association, and unless he, or a man of his character, is nominated by the Republicans, thereby driving the association to the Domocrats, there is no hope for Cleveland to be re-elected. In my judge ment Hill is as strong as Cleveland, or stronger, and, where Cleveland, has only the one chance that I have named, Hill has, I might say, every chance."

Redemption of Trade Dollars

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 .- The time, allotted for the redemption of trade dollars will expire on the 3d of next month. The amount redeemed up to date is a little over \$7,400,000. The number of these dollars estimated to be held in this country by the Director of the Mint was 7,036,000, and the slight excess in redemption is account ed for by importations from China and lapan.

Dend in Bed.

Anonia, Conn., Aug. 24. - Morris H. Baxter, twenty-eight years of age and unmarried, a druumer of Danbury, Conn., who came here last year as agent for an embossing oil, was found dead in bed at the Dayton House this afternoon. He had written to friends in Ridgefield, but his letters were unheeded. Death resulted from rheumatism of the heart.

The Porte and Ferdinand.

CONSTANTINOBLE, August 25. - The Porte has telegraphed to Prince Ferdinand that it disapproves of his entry into Bulgaria without the sanction of Port and of the prowers.
