MAXIMILIAN'S ESCUTCHEON.

His Friends Unite in an Effort to Wipe Away the Blot Upon It.

CITY OF MEXICO, Sept. 3.—The publication in yesterday's Monitor of the substance of the report of Gen. Escobedo's statements has not met with denial openly, but the friends of Maximilian content themselves with demonstrating the supposititious character of the letter in which Maximilian recommends Lopez to maintain absolute secrecy about the mission with which he had been intrusted by Maximilian to Escobedo.

In addition to the above facts, which prove the falsity of the letter, the following evidence is adduced to substantiate the charge that the fall of Queretaro was directly due to treachery: 1-Republicans were allowed to occupy the convent of La Cruz, where Lopez was in command, without resistance. 2-After the fall of Queretaro, Gen. Lopez was the only Imperialist leader whom the republicans allowed to remain at large.
