POLITICIANS' PERILS.

Judge Whittaker resigned rather than get left and W. R. Allen was appointed in his place.

Judge Graves failed to get re-nominated for Judge last week at Wilksboro, being defeated by W. N. Mebane on the 38th ballot.

Judge Armfield failed to get re-nominated and B. F. Long will get the nomination plum.

Judge Shuford was defeated for nomination at Dillboro last Thursday on the 3rd ballot by H. B. Carter, of Asheville, brother of the Revenue collector.

Judge Byrum, it is thought, will be defeated.

Alexander, congressman from Charlotte, has withdrawn from the race for nomination as defeat was inevitable. He was too loose a democrat for the city fellows, while Ben Bunn has had to withdraw because he was too tight on the silver question for the farmers and true democrats of the Raleigh District.

Mr. Grady, of Dublin, only got 11 votes for re nomination for Congress; John Shaw, of Fayetteville, getting the nomination.

Congressman Bower has been re-nominated.

It is thought that Congressman Henderson will be nominated by a good majority.

Oliver Allen, of Kinston, E. V., Pon, of Smithfield, and W. W. Barber, of Wilksboro, have been re-nominated for Solicitors.

Senator Ramson failed to get a single vote at the county convention in Weldon last week, while Catarras county wants Ramson and Jarvis both.

Every county that has acted so far has passed resolutions favoring electing Senators by primaries, and most of them have endorsed Jarvis.

A resolution endorsing Cleveland was laid on the table by a vote of 23 to 7 in the First Maryland Congressional District.
