### KINSTON BANK FAILURE.

Like a "thunderbolt from a clear sky" yesterday (Tuesday) morning came the statement that Mr. S. H. Loftin, banker and merchant, had failed.

The actual deposits will probably not exceed \$50,000. The other liabilities we roughly estimate at \$60,000. The nominal assets are perhaps in the neighborhood of \$135,000.

The failure is thought by many to be due to advancing money to and endorsing paper for the proposed Great Eastern Railway.

The failure is a matter of deep humiliation to Mr. Loftin. He feels deeply the trouble he causes his friends and patrons. They should be as lenient in their views of the trouble as they can. It is not good business policy to cause any more trouble than can be avoided. The failure of a man who has carried on a banking business in Kinston since 1883 and who has given accommodations to so large a portion of the community is a regrettable calamity. Every citizen should do all they can to ease the effect of the blow—should strengthen and help each other. If this is done the evil effects of the failure will be minimized. Kinston Free Press.

### THE BEST WAY.

Secretary of State J. Bryan Grimes has inaugurated an innovation in connection with the printing of the laws which will prove a great convenience and saving for the people generally who have occasion to want copies of these laws. He has the State printers as they make up the forms for the printing of the acts in book form to strike off say 50 copies of each law in regular book page form. These are placed on file so that they can be mailed to any interested citizen who may have occasion to request a copy for any purpose. Heretofore the only way to get a copy of most of the general and special acts was to copy it from the original, this system entailing much work on the clerical force of the State Department as well as needless expense upon the party asking for the copy. —Raleigh Post.
