## ARE AMERICANS CIVILIZED?

William Jay Youmans, editor of Appleton's Popular Science Monthly, raises the question, "Are the American People Civilized?" Mr. Youmans is inclined to take a negative view of their qualifications for that distinction.

In view of the fact that the meaning and content of the term "Civilization" has not been very definitely settled there is naturally room for some difference of opinion. A varying standard will yield various results.

Viewed in a lump, however, how is it possible to doubt the civilization of a people who daily give such fine exhibitions of it? Has not Kansas given Mrs. Lease to the whole country and Mr. Pepper to the senate of the United States? And Kansas, you will please to remember, has some time been inelegantly dubbed "wild and woolly." Surely then if a community popularly accredited with standing well down toward the foot of the column can show up so magnificently there should be no question about the rest of the country.

Then we have Marcus A. Hanna, the most powerful man in American politics today, whatever the result of the Ohio election may be. Is it not another evidence of an elevated state of civilization that he should stand peddled as an exemplar worthy of close copying by the ambitious youth of the country? Mr. Hanna, who has evidenced his ability and statesmanship by collecting several million dollars more than was needed to elect a president; Mr. Hanna, who can make a speech of which any school boy sixteen years old might justly be proud and who put a negro to shame who tried conclusions with him in the slinging of street English.

There is Boston, too, aesthetic, ultra, Browning-loving Boston, the very acme and cream and pure efflorescence of civilization. It is only just now that an organization of her fair, frail women have made the whole country dilate with pride in her by a concerted attack, infinitely delicate, upon marriageable bachelors that has already resulted, we are assured, in an ex-mayor's launching fearlessly on the sea of connubial bliss. A whole fleet is expected to follow suit shortly.

It is difficult to see how Mr. Youmans could have overlooked the signs right in his own bailiwick, New York, under his very nose; evidences that must ooze in at every chink and crevice of his office daily. Has not one representative of each of the warring factions given an example of proficiency in the use of profanity that made all the jack tars in port turn pea-green with envy? Did anybody ever hear a Fiji or a bushman swear on the stump in a mayoralty contest, however high his enthusiasm might mount, or however provoking the opposition might grow? We grow not. He is only a poor barbarian.

Has not Mr. Youmans read the public prints? Is he not aware that during the long, hot, dry summer just passed, with infinite exertion, we lynched some three or four hundred men to show how dear to our hearts are the ways of civilization? Some of them were guilty and some were innocent, but the beautiful impartiality shown is a strong proof of extra attainments. It is only highly enlightened peoples that raise so much fearlessly righteous indignation at short notice that all law and order is swept away on the crest of the popular wave.

And then, ah then, coming nearer home, has not dear, dozy, conservative, law-abiding old North Carolina put up Mr. Butler and Mr. Russell, and Keeper Burns and Dr. Kirby Smith and a whole host of legislators and things to show that she must be reckoned with when the talk is of civilization? You just bet she has.

Dear, dear, Mr. Youmans, we charge thee fling away pessimism and come off. When it comes to being civilized we are a lonesome pebble down by the sounding sea.

Very unfortunate was the killing of Von Gammon in the Virginia-Georgia football game. It will, of course, draw a flood of criticism from the press, some of which will be sensible and pertinent and some of which will be senseless and impertinent. There is a certain element of danger in the game, under any circumstances, just as there is an element of danger in all forms of physical exercise. There are other amusements, however, equally dangerous, and without the redeeming features of football, against which no voice is raised and no line is written. There is no need to go into righteous hysterics over the matter. A young lady who was walking along the streets of a certain city stumbled and in falling was impaled on the steel rod of her umbrella. Let all people henceforth take the rain. More people lost their lives at Garrisons than football has killed in all its history. Let nobody ride on a train except on business. The country need not be treated to a pyrotechnic display of very cheap indignation.

It is to be hoped that no one will suggest that the newly appointed Virginia postmaster, who has just been shot while stealing wheat, was a fair specimen of recent appointees. There is the best of evidence that many of them would not be caught stealing wheat.

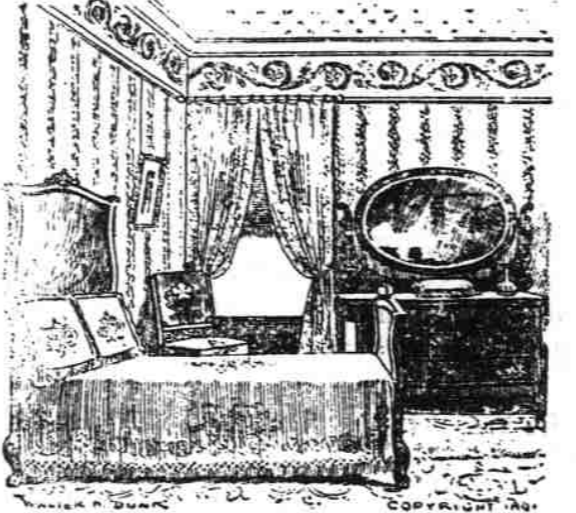
