The Esquimaux Lieutenant Peary the Arctic explorer, brought to New York, are in a hospital in that city for treatment of bronchial and pulmonary disorders.

An insurance society, to be called Industria, is being formed by employers throughout Germany to insure against loss arising from strikes. The society will have a capital of 500,000

A Brooklyn policeman arrested the driver of a hearse containing the body of a woman, and made the driver take the vehicle to the police station to answer a charge of running down a boy bicyclist.

It is believed that the Georgia legislature will pass a bill making the playing of football in that state a misdemeanor in view of the fatal injury of R. V. Gammon, a University of Georgia player, while taking part in a game.

The London Times publishes a dispatch from Seoul, capital of Corea, which says that the Russian minister has forced the Corean government to dismiss its English financial adviser and chief of customs and to put a Russian in his place.
