THE NEWS GROWS GRAVER.

Officials Regard Situation as Extremely Critical.

TREACHERY THEORY GAINS.

The President Hopes it Was an Accident--Results of Investigation

Are Kept Secret.

By Wire to THE TELEGRAM.

New York, Feb. 25-The Evening Sun says: This morning's news from Washington is graver than it has been since the Maine was sunk. High officers of the administration no longer conceal the fact that they regard the situation as extremely critical. While nothing is being said as to the result of the court of inquiry all news that comes out whether true or not, supports the belief that the Maine was

blown up by outside agencies. The President and Secretary Long still hope the result of the inquiry will show that the Maine was blown up by accident. If the results show that it was blown up by treachery the President is reported as saying that war is inevitable. From the very first the administration in all its branches has rushed preparations for the contingency of war. The Maine commission holds a daily session and takes every precaution to keep the results secret. The censorship at Havana is so strict that correspondents can hardly get news through. More unexploded powder was recovered from the Maine today.
