AN ARMISTICE IS DECLARED Between President McKinley and Congress.

YET THERE IS GREAT DISGUST

Representatives of the Foreign Powers Call on President McKinley and Plead for Peace.

Washington, April 7—Consul General Lee cables that quiet prevails and that 200 Americans have left.

Elaborate preparations are going on at the White House for the entertainment of 100 guests in the east room by Mrs. McKinley in honor of a number of ladies who are visiting her.

Washington, April 7—Congressman Grosvenor, after a conference with the president this morning, said that there would be no change in the message unless there is a change of facts which is unlikely.

The senate committee on foreign affairs didn't meet today. Senator Gray of the foreign relations committee, after a talk with the president, expressed the belief that Minister Woodford and General Lee would not remain at their posts after the opening of next week.

Washington, April 7—A cable from Minister Woodford concerning yesterday's cabinet meeting has been received, but it contains nothing significant.

Washington, April 7—Representatives of England, France, Germany, Austria, Russia and Italy called on the president and Secretary of State Sherman today to plead for peace.
