#### CAMARA IS IN THE SUEZ CANAL.

Havana Not So Gay -- Ships Ready to Sail--Annexation Debate-Sagasta

Denies the Crisis. By Wire to THE TELEGRAM.

Washington, June 27-President McKinley today sent two special messages to congress providing for the recognition of the services of Hobson and his crew in blocking the harbor of Santiago de Cuba; of Newcomb and the crew of the revenue cutter Hudson which rescued the torpedo boat Winslow under the fire of the batteries at Cardenas; of Captain Hodgson of the despatch boat McCullooh which figured in the battle of Manila; also of Cadet Powell who took a launch under the forts at Santiago to rescue the crew of the Merrimac. In the message authority is asked of the senate to transfer Hobson from the construction corps to the line of the navy. In his message, in mentioning Hobson, the president cites the fact that the members of his crew have already been promoted.

CADIZ FLEET BOTTLED UP. Port Said, June 27-Admiral Camara's fleet is here but is unable to obtain coal and consequently cannot proceed further. The admiral requested that he be allowed to purchase ten thousand tons but the government refused to permit him to coal his fleet in Egyptian waters. Shore liberty has been denied to the seamen of his fleet.

#### Army Mail Facilities.

The soldiers in the present war have nany conveniences that were unknown to the soldiers on either side during the civil war, and one of these is mail facilities. A number of expert postal clerks and mail-sorters went to Cuba with General Shafter and a postoffice has been established near Santiago. After a battle, the soldiers who survive an write letters to their home people with the assurance that the letters will be delivered at their destination almost as quickly as in times of peace. What is better still, for the soldier, he can get letters from home with a certain degree of regularity. No such condition of affairs existed during the late war, and in many other respects the soldiers of today are more fortunately conditioned than were some of their fathers, who bore many hardships that will not be encountered in the war now n progress. - Charlotte Observer.

Watson Sails Today to Join Admiral Sampson's Squadron.

#### SHIPS COMPOSING THE FLEET.

Pushing Troops Toward Santiago-Shafter Pleased -- Camara Must

Fight or Run.

By Wire to THE TELEGRAM. Washington, June 27-The navy department issued the following bulletin this morning:

Commadore Watson, now commanding the blockading squadron before Havana, has been ordered to sail today on board the Newark to form a junction with Admiral Sampson where he will take command of the armored squadron. One of the American commanders will thence proceed at once with swift cruisers to the coast of Spain.

The bulletin does not give the names of the cruisers to compose the new squadron butthe New Orleans, Columbia, Minneapolis, New York and Brooklyn will probably compose its main fighting strength.

WATSON'S SHIPS.

Washington, June 27-Later-The official announcement that a strong fleet will be sent to the Spanish coast has aroused an intense feeling of satisfaction in official circles. It sets at rest all talk of peace negotiations and shows the clear purpose of the administration to follow out an aggressive campaign. The bold announcement seems to have had for its purpose the recalling of Camara's fleet from Port Said which fleet, it is reported, is bound for the Philippines. LAST OF MANILA EXPEDITION. San Francisco, June 27-All of the transports composing the third Manila expedition are in readiness to sail at a moments notice. All the troops and supplies are already aboard but the expedition may be delayed until tomorrow as the work on the Volencia not quite completed. The exact hour of sailing will not be known until the end of the conference between Generals Merritt and McArthus when positive orders are expected from Washington. Additional recruits in large numbers have arrived.

RIGHT ON TO SANTIAGO.

On despatch boat, off Baiquiri June 27-The third and ninth calvary are the only ones remaining here to guard the material. All of the other regiments are being pushed towards Santiago as rapidly as possible. Active operations are expected to begin next Wednesday. Interruptions of the means of communication between the fleet and army by storms is liable to occur at any time. Juragua and Baiquiri both, have open roadsteads with no protection. General Shafter expresses perfect satisfaction at the success in landing the troops.

AT THE GATES OF SANTIAGO.

On despatch boat, off Santiago, June 26-A decisive battle is expected at any moment. General Joe Wheeler's division was within ten miles of the city last Friday night and was joined by reinforcements under General Shafter this morning while Admiral Sampson has reduced every shore battery defense for twenty miles either way along the coast from Santiago. Chaffee's wing of General Wheeler's command has captured and is in possession of Sevilla, seven miles from Santiago, after a sharp battle. The official report places the American loss at twenty-one killed and eighty wounded.
