CAMARA IS IN THE SUEZ CANAL.

Havana Not So Gay--Ships Ready to Sail--Annexation Debate--Sagasta Denies the Crisis.

Washington, June 27—President McKinley today sent two special messages to congress providing for the recognition of the services of Hobson and his crew in blocking the harbor of Santiago de Cuba.

CADIZ FLEET BOTTLED UP.

Port Said, June 27—Admiral Camara's fleet is here but is unable to obtain coal and consequently cannot proceed further.

PASSING THROUGH THE CANAL.

London, June 27—A despatch from Port Said says the Spanish squadron, under Admiral Camara, is passing through the Suez Canal.

CAMARA'S TRIP A RUSE.

Rome, June 27—The Spanish ambassador here says that Camara's trip is only a ruse. He declares that the fleet will remain at Port Said for a few days and will then sail, not through the Suez Canal, but back to Cadiz.

POPE'S MEDIATION ASKED.

Rome, June 27—A Papal nuncio in Madrid telegraphs to the Pope that the queen regent desires the mediation of His Holiness when the opportune moment arrives with the object of concluding the peace negotiations with the United States.

ORDERED TO SPANISH COAST

Watson Sails Today to Join Admiral Sampson's Squadron.

SHIPS COMPOSING THE FLEET.

Pushing Troops Toward Santiago--Shafter Pleased--Camara Must Fight or Run.

By Wire to THE TELEGRAM.

Washington, June 27—The navy department issued the following bulletin this morning:

Commodore Watson, now commanding the blockading squadron before Havana, has been ordered to sail today on board the Newark to form a junction with Admiral Sampson where he will take command of the armored squadron.

The bulletin does not give the names of the cruisers to compose the new squadron but the New Orleans, Columbia, Minneapolis, New York and Brooklyn will probably compose its main fighting strength.

WATSON'S SHIPS.

Washington, June 27—Later—the official announcement that a strong fleet will be sent to the Spanish coast has aroused an intense feeling of satisfaction in official circles.

Commodore Watson will probably include in his fleet the battleships Oregon and Iowa, the cruisers New York, Brooklyn, St. Paul and St. Louis. The partial official list given out by the navy department names as the eastern squadron includes the battleships Oregon and Iowa, the auxiliary cruisers Yosemite, Dixie, Yankee and the colliers Scinda, Abunde and Alexander, with the Newark as flagship.
