FIVE STORY TENEMENT BURNS

In New York City, Injuring Twenty-eight Persons

FIVE WILL VERY LIKELY DIE

One Hundred and Seventy-Five Persons Occupied the Building. Many Thrilling Escapes.

New York, July 11—A big five-story tenement house on Monroe street was burned this morning. Twenty-eight persons were injured or overcome by smoke, including one entire family of eight, five of whom may die. The tenants were awakened at four o'clock this morning by the halls filling with smoke. Police and firemen hurried to the rescue. There were many thrilling escapes. Harris Beasak, with his wife and six children, who were on the sixth floor, were found unconscious. Three of the family were badly burned and overcome by the smoke. The baby, alone unharmed, was found asleep in its cradle. One hundred and seventy-five persons inhabited the tenement.

ALGER IS GOING TO RESIGN

McKinley Had to Ask For His Resignation, Though.

POSITIVE STATEMENT IS MADE

To This Effect in Washington—The President Saw He Wouldn't Resign With a PI in Hint

Washington, July 11—It is now stated positively that the president, during the last fortnight, has intimated to Secretary Alger that they had reached the parting of the ways, and that if the secretary did not resign at once that he would force the president to ask for his resignation. The president then asked for the secretary's resignation in a more formal way. Alger, after several days' consideration, sent in his resignation to take effect some months hence. This was not intended to be made public until fall, but now that it has leaked out, the date of Alger's resignation will undoubtedly be changed, and a formal announcement of his retirement from the cabinet may be looked for at any moment.

GREAT SURPRISE CREATED

By Uncle Sam's Refusal to Arbitrate the Hazelton Matter.

Vienna, July 11—The refusal of the United States to arbitrate the Hazelton matter has created the greatest surprise inasmuch as the American delegates to the peace conference at The Hague have been the warmest adherents of arbitration. However, the refusal is not regarded as offensive or hostile or likely to lead to retaliation. It is not expected that Austria will push the matter further.

Shamrock is Leaky.

London, July 11—Serious leaks were discovered today in the Shamrock. She was ordered to proceed immediately to Southampton for repairs. Consternation prevailed aboard the ship when it was found she had sprung a leak. A great quantity of water had gathered in the hull before the discovery was made. The leak was found along the seams of the plates, which were injured when she went aground off Southampton, June 28th.

White Personally Thanked.

The Hague, July 11—It is learned that Queen Wilhelmina personally thanked Ambassador White, the head of the American delegation, for his American tribute to Grotius. She expressed special admiration of White's speech, the occasion of which was the placing of a tribute to Grotius' tomb at Delft.

Important Order Issued.

Washington, July 11—An order has been issued by the president extending the privileges and the protection of the American flag to shipping from Porto Rico and the Philippines. All ships owned by residents of these islands at the time of the exchange of the ratification treaties, are included in the order.

It was by watching Donnell that the deputy located his man and when his dinner was carried to him today Mr. Weatherly walked in as if to share it. Jones was also injured in the fight. He bears an ugly wound inflicted by Quicker on his left leg.
