BOERS WILL SURELY SHOOT. Did They Disregard a Flag of Truce? THE BOMBARDMENT CONTINUES.

British Entrenchments Daily Growing Stronger and Provisions Ample, Says General Buller.

London, Nov. 10--The war office has today received a dispatch from Gen. Buller, dated at Cape Town, Nov. 9, received by Pigeon Post, which says: "The bombardment continues daily and is a long struggle, the casualties are few and no serious harm has been done."

The Boers sent in today a number of refugees from Transvaal under a flag of truce. The British met them under a flag of truce outside the pickets, and when the parties separated the Boer guns fired on the British party before they reached the picket lines.

Gen. Buller's dispatch further states that the British entrenchments are daily growing stronger and that provisions are ample.

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 10--The transport Moore, with officers and three divisions of the army corps, arrived this morning. A succession of transports are coming which means that the war will begin in earnest.

PARTRIDGES PLENTIFUL--Where Good Shooting May Be Had.

Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 24--The shooting season in this state begins November 1. It is safe to say that not in many years have there been more partridges. It was feared by many persons that the extreme cold weather and the deep snow last February would destroy them.

The legislature, at its last session, enacted a law for a number of counties, requiring hunters to have the written permission of landowners when hunting on the latter's lands.

Sportsmen from the Baltimore section will find good shooting in Randolph county. It is evident that the plan of securing hunting rights by paying the comparatively trifling taxes on lands will be widely extended.

FEELING AGGRAVATED. The Result in Kentucky is Still in Doubt.

Louisville, Nov. 10--Courier-Journal returns at 2 o'clock this morning from the entire state except 35 precincts give Goebel a net plurality of 941. Ten of the missing precincts are Democratic and the others are Republican.

The state of feeling between the factions is aggravated rather than allayed by the developments since Tuesday. Excited meetings are being held in many parts of the state to protest the frauds as alleged. It is contended by the leaders that only the official count will determine the result, which will be followed by a contest before the legislature.

Bloody Outbreak Expected. Middleboro, Ky., Nov. 10--The authorities here are indignant because the governor has not responded to the request for troops to quell the disturbances over the election contest.

Tannery Plant Burned. Boston, Nov. 10--A serious fire broke out in the leather district at Woburn this morning. The entire tannery plant of Beggs & Cobb, valued at \$75,000, was burned, and the adjoining factories of the Stepan Dowe Co. are threatened.

Wheaton Surprised 'Em. Manila, Nov. 10--General Wheaton has surprised the Filipinos along the shores of Gulf Lingayan. He landed his men at an unexpected point and established a basis before the insurgents could be got together.

For the Dewey Arch. New York, Nov. 10--Col. John Jacob Astor, it is reported, has given a hundred thousand dollars to the Dewey arch. This makes a half million subscribed, or about a third of the sum necessary.
