



The Riverside Cotton Mills to Increase Capital Stock.

Danville, Jan. 12-It is announced here that the Riverside Cotton Mill Co., at a meeting of the directors, has authorized an increase of the capital stock from \$2,000,000 to \$4,000,000. It is already one of the biggest mills in the south, and this increase, if carried out, will make it still greater.

Bellamy's Bill Is Receiving a Large Support.

Washington, Jan. 12-Representative Bellamy, who, as reported the other day has introduced a bill in the house of representatives, aimed at the paper trust of the country, is receiving considerable support. The bill, if passed by congre-s would be a direct blow to the trust, which has been enabled by the duty to keep up high prices on paper. The removal of the entire duty on wood pulp, and the reduction of the duty on manufactured paper 50 per cent, as the measure proposes, would do much toward breaking up the present combination existing. The paper trust, it is needless to say, is fighting the removal of the duty on wood pulp and the reduction of the duty on manufactured paper,

the house in favor of the passage of the bill is found to be very great. The southern members of congress, including, it is believed, the entire South Carolina, North Carolina, Virgina and Texas delegations are in favor of Mr. Bellamy's measure.
