DIM YOUR LIGHTS WHEN PASSING OTHERS

The last Legislature passed a law compelling autoists to dim their lights when they passed each other at night, and the observance of such a law by the motorists will add much to their own safety. In many sections custom has caused them to dim their lights, but many in this section do not take this safety precaution, even when failure to do so is against the law.

Every man with a car should dim his lights when passing another car, and should "bawl out" any one who passes him without doing the same thing. The blinding glare of strong headlights has caused many a car to land in the ditch.

THE RETURNED GOODS EVIL

It has not been so very long ago that a cash customer was considered better than one whose name was carried upon the books. Cash customers were sought, and prizes and discounts were offered in an effort to induce cash purchases. But of late many stores have seemed to prefer the charge class of buyers, probably for the reason that they will buy more and discriminate less when they are buying on time. So keen has been the competition for this class of trade that many inducements have been offered to land it for the advertisers. Chief among the inducements offered has been the right of approval, and the charge class of buyers have made it a nuisance and a burden upon the other people.

Seldom if ever are goods which are returned in as good a condition as they were at first. They may have been soiled, torn, or even worn, and when finally returned have deteriorated greatly. Every merchant is familiar with the loss entailed by this process of approval, and of course the customers have to foot the bill. The overhead charge on this class of trade is frightful when compared with the original cost of the article, but it must be paid by the cash customers to make up for the loss to the merchant.

Many stores throughout the country are putting into effect a "You Tote" plan, whereby every customer carries away his purchases, and where there are no returns of goods on approval. In this way the buyer who goes to that store gets his money's worth, and does not have to shell out an extra twenty per cent of the selling price to pay for the evils and extravagances of the charge and approval system. By eliminating the delivery system and the approval system the merchant is able to do business on a cheaper scale, and is able to pass the saving along to his customer.

As a war measure for eliminating unnecessary labor, and a measure of good, sound, common sense, such systems should be discarded, or at least greatly reduced. It is obsolete, and has been worked to death, and has no place in the modern world of scientific economy and efficiency.

AMERICAN PHYSICIANS FIGHT HOOKWORM IN SOUTH AMERICA

 RIO DE JANEIRO.—Through the efforts of Dr. Chas. Seidl, Director of the Public Health Department, and Drs. Lewis, Wednell Hackett and Geo. Stone of the Rockefeller Foundation, the government has given the American institution free hand to wage a campaign on the "hookworm" in the

interior of Brazil. The percentage of inhabitants of the outlying districts afflicted with the disease is high, according to Health Department officials.

Creditable work has already been done by the American physicians and it is believed the proposed campaign will be of inestimable value in the stimulation of agricultural enterprise.

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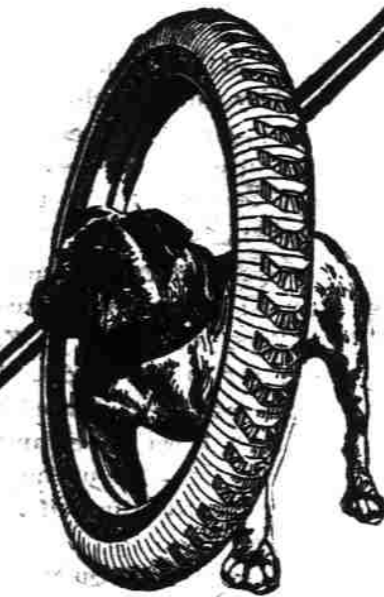
