

PITT COUNTY'S QUOTA FOR NEW NATIONAL ARMY IS 336

DRAWING OF DRAFT NUMBERS COMPLETED

(By United Press) WASHINGTON. The drawing of draft numbers ended at 2:38 this morning after sixteen hours and eighteen minutes of continuous drawing.

The first call of men will be twice the number of the actual quota of each county. If a county must furnish two hundred men, four hundred men will be called first and if these do not furnish the required two hundred, a fresh list must be drawn.

The first ones called are those who were drawn out first in their respective districts.

Pitt County's quota has been set at 336 men. Therefore the first 672 names that were drawn out will be the first ones to be called before the Board of Exemptions.

Every name that has been registered will be drawn out. Some time this week the Governor of North Carolina will notify the Pitt County Board how many men that Pitt county will be required to furnish.

If that number is three hundred, then the first three hundred whose names were drawn today will be taken. If one hundred of these are exempted, then the next one hundred will be called before the board.

In other words, the men will be called before the exemption board in the order in which they were drawn today, and enough will be taken to complete the number of men that Pitt county will be called upon to furnish.

Germans Keep Up Offensive Against French

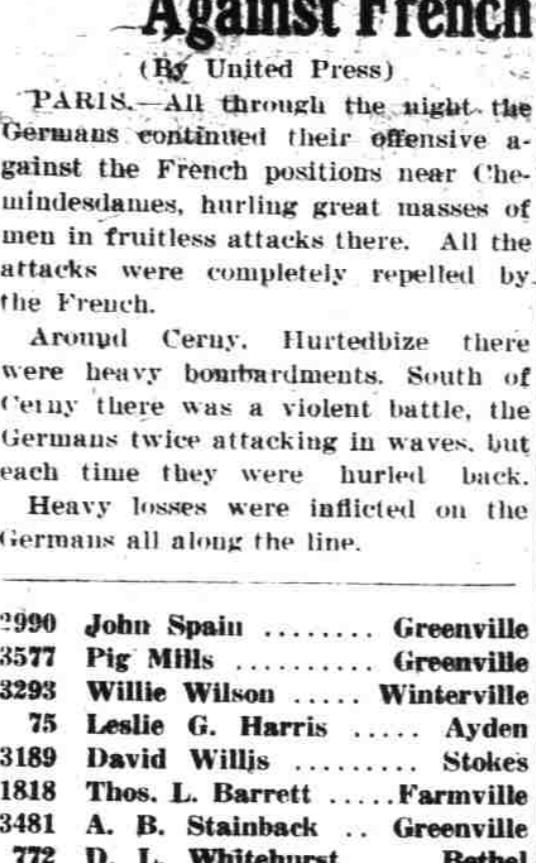
(By United Press) PARIS.—All through the night the Germans continued their offensive against the French positions near Chemin-des-dames, hurling great masses of men in fruitless attacks there. All the attacks were completely repelled by the French.

Around Cerny, Hurtelbize there were heavy bombardments. South of Cerny there was a violent battle, the Germans twice attacking in waves, but each time they were hurled back.

Heavy losses were inflicted on the Germans all along the line.

Lloyd George Says Germany is Waning

(By United Press) LONDON.—"Those in charge of German affairs have elected for war," declared Premier Lloyd George in his speech this afternoon at Queenshall replying to Michaelis' address. "The chancellor's statement contained phrases which German military authorities understood. The Junkers have thrown the old chancellor into the waste-basket with his scrap of paper." Lloyd George continued, "and it will not be long before Junkerdom follows him. The German Chancellor held out no hope for Belgium. Belgium was not mentioned by him. It is the determination of the Allies that Belgium must be restored."

Boches Run From British

(By United Press) LONDON.—German troops in the trenches around Grenland Hill north of Rouen hurriedly withdrew last night when British patrol parties approached. General Haig reported today. There were successful heavy raids south of La Bassée and Armentières where German positions on a wide front and many dugouts were bombed.

Not Resigned, Says Goethals

(By United Press) WASHINGTON.—"I have not resigned, but I cannot tell what will develop," said General Goethals regarding the rumor that he had resigned. Chairman Demman stated today that exchanges of letters with Goethals will continue until the building program can be launched with the approval of the Shipping Board.

INTENSE FIGHTING ON RUSSIAN FRONT. HEAVY ARTILLERY DUEL

KERENSKY IS NEW PREMIER OF RUSSIA. MINISLER APPOINTED
