## "RAMBOW DNISION OF FGUARDS WIL BENEXT TOGOTO CHPOPE

WASHINGTON.-America's "Rainbow Division," 19,000 strong, will be the next to see service in France. This division is comprised of National Guardsmen representing the various States from New York to Texas, and is known as the 42nd Division, and will soon be sent abroad, Secretary of War Baker announced today.
This is a new division assembled under the reent reorganization plan, and represents the flower of the National Guard troops from all parts
of the country, including cavalry, infantry, eng $i-1$ neers, machine gun and artillery companieshence the name, "Rainbow Division." It also includes an engineering regiment whose number is
the 117th, the first battalion of which is to be a the 117th, the first battalion of which is to be
battalion of the South Carolina National Guard. The headquarters train and police force will be the Coast Artillery Corps of the Virginia National Guard; the Engineers' train will be the En-
gineer Corps of the North Carolina National Guard.
