mere bubble upon the surface if we would only use brains in cultivating our crops, said the governor. He spoke of the necessity of giving food in this critical time when our nation is at war. So far as he was concerned, he would rather die than for America to lose this war, that he would not give ten cents for any property or have possessions of any kind if Germany were to be victorious and we were to live under its ideal of government.
