GENTRY & GORHAM MARKET REPORT

The market closed Friday and will open again on the 8th of January.

Prices at Gormans were as good as they have been this Season, except on the tobacco above 38c and these were better Thursday and Friday than at any time since the 3rd week in November. Our customers went home happy.

The Market sold 1,217,852 pounds in December at an average of \$29.60 per hundred. Gormans sold of this 532.326 pounds at an average of \$30.65. This gives Gormans an average of \$1.86 per hundred more on its 532,320 pounds, than the other four houses sold their 685,526 pounds for, and this in the face of the much larger per cent of common tobacco and scrap that Gorman sells. The market has sold todate 20,986,553 pounds. Gormans has sold 7,044,519 pounds which is more than a third. There is a REASON.

We look for an active market in January. We wish to thank each and every one of our customers for the prosperous year we have enjoyed.
