encouraging response from the Teutons however. And when they began plowing to Russia, officials here felt that little hope for a revolution in Germany or a separate peace with Austria was ahead—except in keeping on with war tasks and using the mailed fist as the most persuasive of all arguments.

The Russian collapse and the trend of German conquest in the near east has rendered the war task more difficult for the Allies and America; but it is a task far from hopeless for the German strength is not unlimited, and with the American reservoir of strength tapped, Germany's doom is sealed. Sooner or later, she will be beaten.

That is a certainty—almost as certain as a mathematical calculation.

And, if America keeps on her war tasks with the same spirit of courage and tenacity as she is now manifesting, this defeat for Germany will come sooner than the pessimists have thought.

Let me have this information not later than Saturday, April 6, if you want your name on the printed list that will be sent out to the teachers.

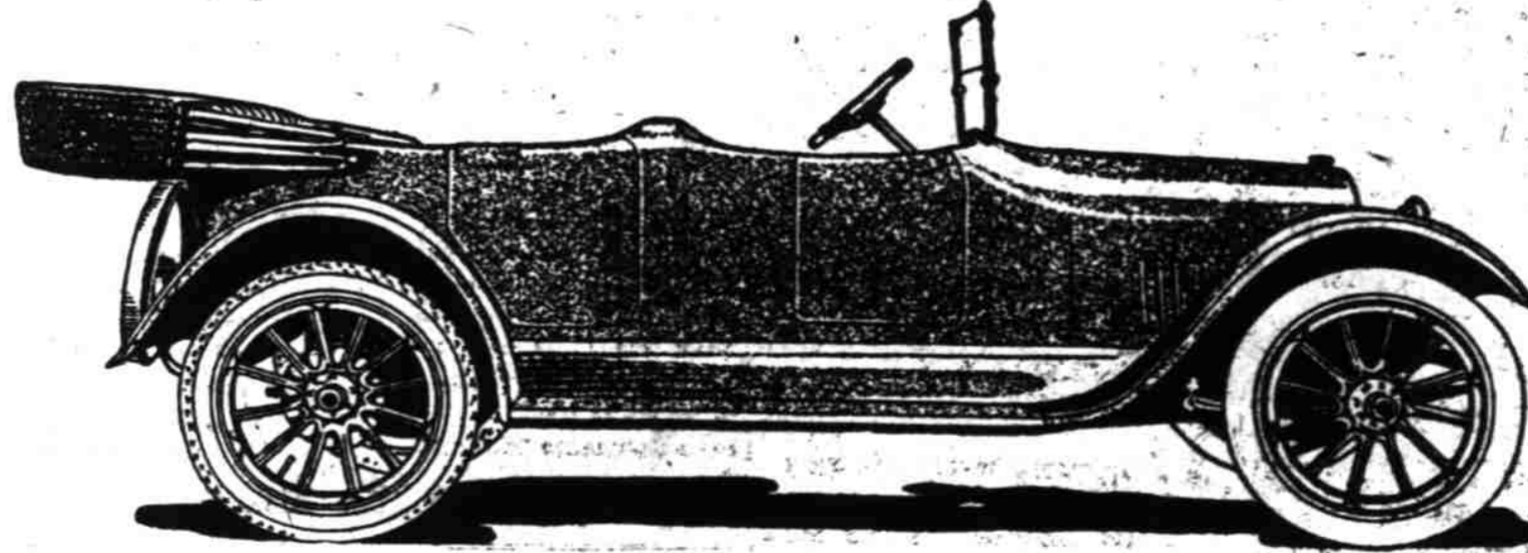
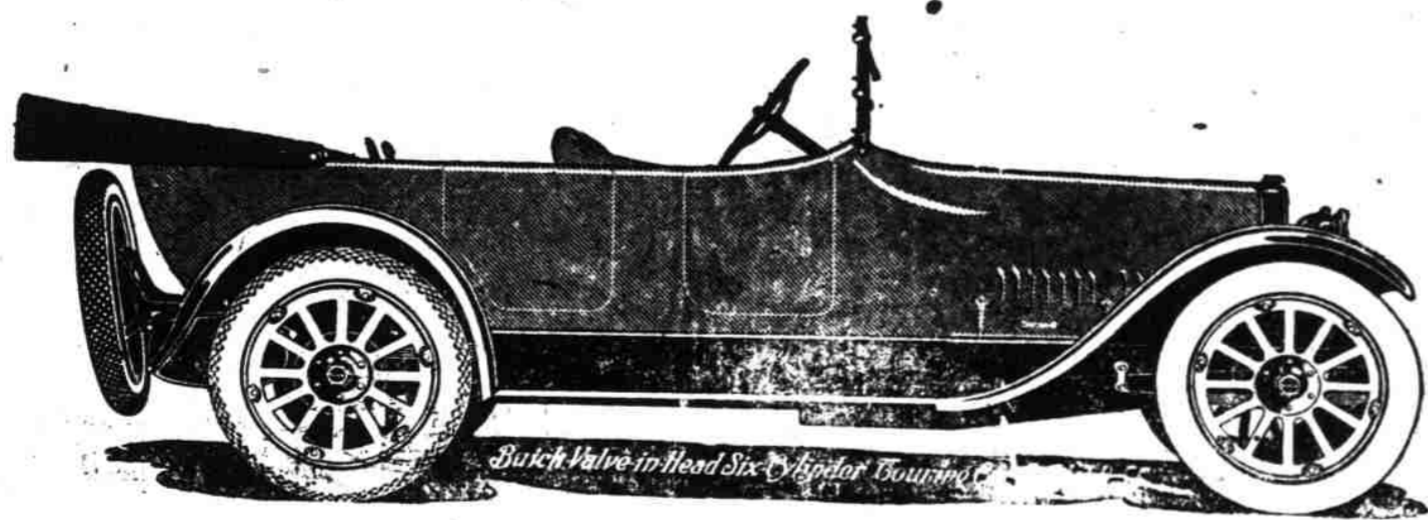
