### Tuberculosis Test Is Offered Free

In the fight against the ravages of the "Great White Plague" in North Carolina the extension department of the Bureau of Tuberculosis of the State Board of Health is doing a notable work in making the diagnosis of the disease easier, as well as in treating several hundred of the citizens of the State each year.

ing sent free on request a tube of tuberculin for the Von Pirquet diagnostic test, together with simple directions which will enable any person to make the test for themselves.

The directions are to scarify three places on the upper forearm, using sterile knife or needle and removing the outer layer of skin without bringing blood, in the same manner as preparing for smallpox vaccination. A small amount of the tuberculin is then placed on the upper and lower scarifications, the middle one being left as a control, and care is urged that no tuberculin be allowed to touch this control scarification.

Within twelve to forty eight hours an inflammation will develop around the two scarifications on which tuberculin was placed in the case of a positive reaction, sometimes very mild, sometimes a red that it almost glows. It begins to fade within a few hours, and is gone in from twelve to forty-eight hours. No permanent scar is left nor ill effects felt.

A positive reaction indicates that the patient has been infected with the germs of tuberculosis, but does not necessarily mean that the infection is active. In the absence of reaction, termed a negative reaction, all three scars should dry up quickly and disappear without any sign of inflammation around the scarified areas.

The Bureau of Tuberculosis urges the use of the test in all suspected cases as an aid to diagnosis, and especially urges that all members of a family in which there is a case of tuberculosis take the test. Following a positive reaction a careful examination is urged.

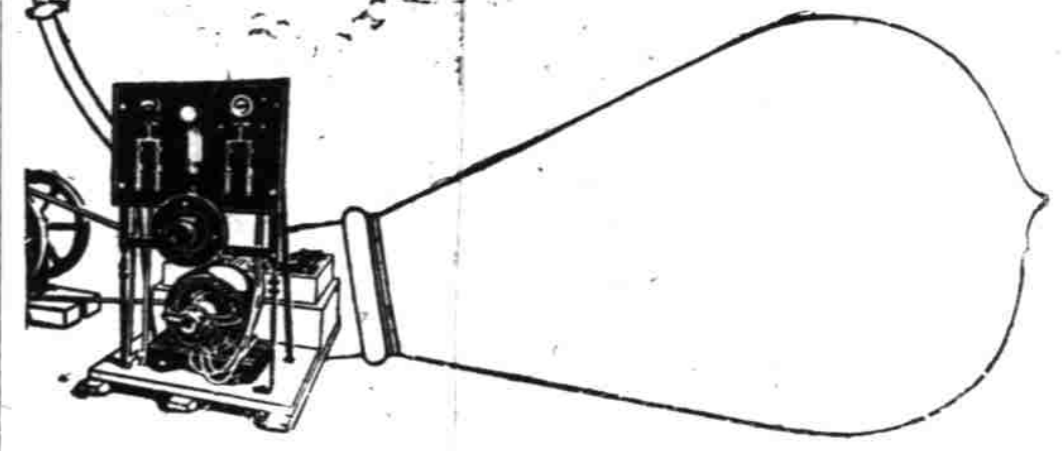
