Registrants between 18 and 45 inclusive, will facilitate the work of the Legal Advisory Board materially, if when they receive their questionnaires, they will proceed to read the same and answer all the questions contained therein that they can answer; and those who can fill out the entire questionnaire will only have to swear to it before any member of the Legal Advisory Board, or its associates, a Justice of the Peace, Postmaster or Notary Public. After doing this they can mail it to the Local Exemption Board. Those who can only partially fill out the Questionnaire, can present it to the Legal Advisory Board or any of its associates, and it will take very little time to complete the same. This is important and the request is made direct to the Registrants to follow these instructions.

TO COLLECT CLOTHING FOR BELGIANS

A regular allotment of 4,342 pounds of clothing is required as the contribution of the Pitt County Chapter. Let every housekeeper look over the wardrobe of her whole family, selecting from it whatever she can spare to send to these destitute, suffering people, clothes and shoes for men, women and children, material which can be made into garments, sheets, blankets or bed coverings.

With three sales this week, (2nd, 1st, 3rd) Gorman's sold 659,318 Lbs. Prices, except on the very low grade and black tips, have been as high as at any time this season and these grades are from 2 to 5.00 higher with us than on the smaller markets.

With the weather cooler we look for stiffer price the coming week and believe after Tuesday that the sales will be lighter. Greenville finished all sales the past week each day except Monday, when we were blocked.

Relative to the talk and insinuations as to our shipped trade, will say we have not bought or had bought any tobacco on any market other than Greenville this season. All the shipped tobacco pays us full charges same as the farmers pays and if we did not make the shipper money they would not continue to ship.

Wilson sells over 10,000,000 pounds of shipped tobacco each season. The parties doing so much talking have in the past sold all that has been shipped them.

Gentry & Gorman take care of their farmers and YOU DO NOT HEAR ANY COMPLAINTS from their trade either from planter or shipper as to lower prices. If our shipped trade crowded our planters out of our house, would it not work to the benefit of our competitors and do you believe they would try to knock us? No, but they are trying to make excuses for their weakness.

A few sales made Thursday. The lower averages are tips or medium tobacco.
