THE ELECTION

The result of the election in Pitt county Tuesday ought to be gratifying to every citizen for it shows conclusively that the people still have confidence in the way Democrats manage affairs. The voters spoke at the polls in a way not to be misunderstood and that they desired no change. The officers elect will take office on the first Monday in December and they will enter upon their duties with the very best wishes of the entire county.

In North Carolina, as was to be expected, the Democrats rolled up a handsome majority and returned to the senate of the United States, Hon. F. M. Simmons and the probability is elected all ten congressmen. It would have indeed been a calamity to the state if Snator Simmons had failed of re-election for no man in that august body wields more influence with both parties, and no man has never represented this great state that did more for the folks back home. The citizens of the state are to be congratulated upon his re-election for another term of six years to the upper national house. In the nation the returns indicate that the Republicans have made gains in both the senate and the house, our dispatches going so far yesterday to state that the next house would be Republican and if that either party controlled the senate it would be by a close margin. If the Republicans do get control of the house and senate it will work bad for the country when at the head of the nation they have placed a man whose every act since he became president has been for the betterment of mankind and the safety of Democracy. But for America today Belgium, and France would be in a sadder plight than they are.
